Youth ages 6 - 18 in Berkeley, Jefferson, and Morgan counties are the future of the Eastern Panhandle and the state of West Virginia. When our community members invest in them, they are investing in the future. Programs provided by the Boys & Girls Club are an important component of that investment. Since 87% of youth served by the Boys & Girls Club of the Eastern Panhandle are from low-income families, ensuring they receive the academic and social support they need to succeed in school and life is essential. This is accomplished by providing programs such as Power Hour homework help and tutoring, Positive Action, and Torch and Keystone Community Service Clubs to address five focus areas: education and career; character and leadership; health and life skills; the arts; and sports, fitness, and recreation. Mentoring is the thread that runs through all of these programs as research demonstrates that supportive, healthy relationships formed between mentors and mentees contribute to a host of benefits, including increased high school graduation rates, lower high school dropout rates, better attitudes about school, higher college enrollment rates, and enhanced self-esteem and self-confidence. This is why Mentoring Matters Most (Triple M) is the foundation of all programming at the Boys & Girls Club of the Eastern Panhandle. Mentoring services are provided by professional staff and volunteers to ensure that every young person who attends the Boys & Girls Club receives personal attention. Mentor/mentee interactions are documented in an online system on a weekly basis. These services can't be provided for free. Since Triple M is incorporated into all BGCEP programming, donations are used to cover the \$1,000 gap between fees, other funding sources, and the actual cost of delivering services, which is approximately \$2,800 per child per year. Donations through the Neighborhood Investment program help cover that \$1,000 gap for 100 children.

West Virginia faces the highest per capita rate of children in foster care, according to the Annie E. Casey Foundation. This is particularly evident in Berkeley, Jefferson, and Morgan counties of the Eastern Panhandle, where nearly 800 children aged 0-18 are removed from their homes due to abuse and neglect. The shortage of foster families compounds the challenges these vulnerable children endure, often resulting in distant placements due to local capacity limits. Child welfare professionals prioritize kinship placements to minimize trauma and maintain familial and cultural ties, as they offer the best environment for overall well-being. However, many kinship caregivers lack adequate support and resources, hampering their ability to meet placement criteria and provide necessary care. Insufficient resources exacerbate stress and hinder long-term placement success. CASA-EP addresses these pressing issues through the "Make it Happen" Fund, establishing emergency resources to assist families or close family friends in meeting state requirements for kinship placements. This fund swiftly provides essential items and services, reducing the need for foster care. Provisions often include but are not limited to beds, car seats, household supplies, diapers, clothing, transportation, and medical supplies. Experts universally advocate for familial settings, within the child's community, as the optimal environment for the child's ability to thrive, be it through relatives or foster homes, as opposed to institutional settings. In the event a child is institutionalized or placed in a group setting, they often have no one to offer assistance with items needed. CASA-EP also utilizes these funds to ensure the child has the necessary items for comfort and security in an unfamiliar setting. This includes providing essential items to enhance the child's well-being and ease their transition, such as bedding, personal belongings, and other comforting items.

The HFHEP Safe, Affordable Housing Program provides housing services to low/moderate income families in Berkeley, Jefferson, and Morgan Counties. Income guidelines are based on HUD's income limits at the time of application with most partner families being at or below 60% of the median family income. Small exterior repair services are provided to income eligible residents of owner-occupied housing who are willing and able to partner with HFHEP, able to make any required payments, and can demonstrate the need for repairs. The scope of work for these projects may include painting, landscaping, decking/porch repair, and other small exterior work needed to preserve the integrity and safety of the house. Houses may be purchased by Habitat then rehabbed with help from the partner family selected to purchase the home, contractors, and community volunteers. The house is sold to the partner family through a zero-interest loan with an amount that keeps their mortgage payment including taxes and insurance, at or below 30% of their income. New homes are constructed on lots owned by Habitat and then sold to an eligible partner family through a zero-interest loan with an amount that keeps their mortgage payment including taxes and insurance, at or below 30% of their income. Partner families must complete sweat equity during the repair, rehab or construction of the house as their contribution to the partnership with Habitat.

Whether it be repairs, rehab or new construction, each project taken-on under the HFHEP Safe, Affordable Housing Program aims to create a safe, healthy, energy efficient environment for the partner families to call home. NIP funds will allow Shenandoah Community Health Foundation to support Patient-Centered Care and Self-Management for patients of the Primary Care department of Shenandoah Community Health (SCH). With NIP donations, the Foundation will purchase additional medical equipment and corresponding supplies to diagnose, monitor, and treat patients with chronic disease. Classified as a Primary Care Medical Home, SCH offers a wide range of coordinated healthcare services, and staffmembers support and encourage patients to actively participate in their own care by managing their medications, routine monitoring of blood pressure, making healthy lifestyle changes, and following up with appointments and referrals for care. With this project, patients with hypertension will be provided blood pressure cuffs for home-monitoring of blood pressure and will be asked to enter their results in their electronic patient chart to aid the provider in making informed decisions about their care. In keeping with SCH's focus on patient satisfaction, having a second A1C analyzer to provide rapid result testing will reduce waiting time, and the provider will have the results during the appointment when any medication adjustments can be made at that time, eliminating a return appointment for test results. The addition of two more pulse oximeters, used routinely during triage and used during an exam for patients with respiratory issues such as COPD, bronchitis, asthma, will increase efficiency and also reduce wait time for the patient..

Morgan County Family Support Center at Starting Points will continue to utilize NIP credits to leverage additional funds to support a new initiative that addresses the needs of a small, isolated community in the westernmost area of Morgan County called Paw Paw. The town population is 489 according to the 2020 census, but the target population for this expansion would include the outlying area between Great Cacapon/Hampshire County WV and Cumberland, Maryland (MD) as the population base for this expansion. To clarify, we are not offering services in Hampshire County, WV, or Cumberland MD, but the area to the border of these locations is considered "Paw Paw." The site will provide all of the services of the Berkeley Springs site except for Meal Time Community Kitchen. These include emergency food boxes, gas vouchers, baby pantry and hygiene bags, parenting education, playgroups/parent-child socialization, access to County and State resources, access to substance use disorders (SUD) services, life skills education including budgeting and resume development, Healthy Grandfamilies, Cheap Eats nutrition education class, Magic Mondays/Fun Fridays summer activities, Mountaineer Food Bank, and Morgan County Backpack Program. The site will be managed by a full-time program coordinator who has been recruited from the Paw Paw community. This employee has been onboarding with Starting Points for the past year. She is well versed in all services offered by Starting Points. Existing Starting Points staff are to be available to the Paw Paw site through the program coordinator.

The SLI will be a program in which the Madison Farmers Market and Greenhouse becomes a cornerstone of downtown Madison that will spur economic development and innovation, encourage the return of Madison residents and tourists to the downtown area, and increase the number of employment opportunities for those displaced by the economic downturn. By significantly increasing access to fresh produce, providing agricultural education opportunities, and stimulating economic activity and agritourism in the heart of Boone County, BMH is confident that this project will improve the quality of life for the residents of the communities we serve.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Tri-state provides guidance and companionship to youth through a one-to-one relationship with a caring volunteer to assist them in achieving their highest potential. These relationships improve academic performance, reduce risk-taking behaviors, build resilience, and build self-confidence. This is done through a school-based mentoring program, a community-based program, and a high school mentoring program. What sets our mentoring program apart from many in the country is the on-going, professionally managed support that our families, children, and mentors receive during their match. Our staff of Match Support Specialists are social workers dedicated to ensuring that all parties feel safe and comfortable with the match, have the information necessary to be successful, and have support when/if things get difficult. Monthly match support conversations include conversations around activities, interests, and outings, as well as ensuring the ongoing appropriateness of the mentoring relationship and home environment. Following these match support communications, intervention is taken when needed. In 2022 Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Tri-state expanded our services to include Putnam, Mason and Kanawha Counties. This funding request will assist with operational buildout in these counties and supporting growth in service in FY24. While building relationships and enrolling children does take a considerable amount of our employee time, our greatest challenge at Big Brothers Big Sisters is recruiting and enrolling adult mentors. The need is robust. While we can't serve all kids, it is our hope to growth this program to make a substantial impact on our community. We will complete this expansion through community recruitment efforts, establishment of new corporate and community partnerships, and raising awareness of our services in our five counties of service in WV (Cabell, Kanawha, Mason, Putnam, and Wayne).

The Coalition's project will focus on the provision of basic resources and essential services to over 850 individuals currently experiencing homelessness, at risk of becoming homeless, or formerly homeless but stillreceiving services through our day shelter, Harmony House. Harmony House is the only drop-in day shelter serving those experiencing homelessness in the Cabell and Wayne Counties. Drop-in services range from emergency needs, such as medical care provided through partnerships with our local clinics, to everyday essentials like showers, laundry, toiletries, and meals. When these basic needs are met, we are better able to assist clients in navigating the housing process. All programs managed by Harmony House are designed to provide the level of care each client presents with by meeting them where they are at. We have two Rapid Rehousing teams as well as two Supporting Housing Teams whose focus is on prioritizing those living with HIV and those with co-occurring substance use and mental illness. These individualized programs allow teams to identify types of housing that clients can access quickly, but also sustain over time. These teams are also able to assist clients with access to treatment for mental illnesses, substance use disorders, and physical health conditions.

Harmony House also provides office space for community partners who offer services to those individuals and families experiencing homelessness, including Prestera Center's PATH Outreach program and recovery coaches through Prestera and the Cabell-Huntington Health Department. Additionally, we have an office and exam room for our integrated medical clinic through a partnership with Marshall Family Medicine and Marshall University. The clinic has been vital in our efforts in combating the rise in HIV in our area. Individuals resistant to healthcare have been able to access HIV treatment and prevention through this clinic.

The Physical, Medical, and Transportation Services for Low Income Patients and Families was established by the Cabell Huntington Hospital Foundation as a community-based assistance effort to support the needs of the most fragile and vulnerable members in the counties the hospital serves (Cabell, Wayne, Mason, Logan, Mingo, and more). This region includes some of the most highly distress neighborhoods in the state and a significant population impacted by poverty, high incidences of substance abuse, poor health practices, and inconsistent medical care. Among those served by Cabell Huntington Hospital are patients from low-income backgrounds, people and families who are homeless, victims of domestic violence or human trafficking, and those suffering with mental health and substance abuse issues. Our target is to help people who have incomes within 125 percent of the federal poverty line. This project was designed to aid to financially vulnerable patients, thus relieving stresses and worries that far too often present barriers to them seeking needed medical care. Assistance takes many forms, including covering co-pays, pharmaceuticals and medical supplies, payments for prescriptions, transportation to medical appointments (for those not eligible for other transportation services), and hotel accommodations for patients who are traveling long distances for cancer treatments. Far greater than the financial assistance, it provides a measure of hope to patients who are struggling, not only with sometimes desperate medical diagnoses, but also the uncertainty of how they will pay for care and treatment. Funds provided by NIP donations would be instrumental in bringing much-needed financial assistance and the healing power of hope to hundreds of needy patients each year.

DTC provides screenings, evaluations and treatment to assist patients in enhancing their cognitive, fine-motor, gross-motor and communication skills. Our team consists of occupational and physical therapists, speech-language pathologists, support staff, and volunteers. Our occupational therapy team provides intervention treatment to enhance patients' independent functioning in their daily activities. Our physical therapy team assists patients in developing and enhancing mobility, so they may safely participate in activities in their homes and communities. Our speech-language pathology team assesses, diagnoses, treats, and helps prevent disorders related to speech, language, cognitive-communication, voice, swallowing, and fluency. Each discipline develops a plan of care tailored to the patient's needs, including the frequency and intensity of services. The patient's family is an integral part of each treatment session receiving training to carryover the skills learned to all environments.

Through our Lincoln County & Logan County Schools Back Pack Program, Facing Hunger Food Bank seeks to continue to address the nutritional and developmental needs of a minimum of 2150 children qualifying for participation (through the free & reduced breakfast & lunch program) in the back pack program at seven PK-8 schools, and Lincoln County High School in Lincoln county- a total of 820 students; and 17 schools in Logan County, serving an additional 1330 students. The back pack program, started in 2012, is part of our ongoing hunger relief efforts in the counties we serve by including the provision of weekly back packs for each child that are distributed each Friday afternoon. The back packs include breakfast, lunch and dinner, snacks, fruit/vegetables, juice & milk for the weekend, and are expanded in size for longer school breaks. The food bank provides these nutritional back packs to offset the absence, over the weekend and holiday breaks, of the free/reduced breakfast & lunches offered at the schools daily. This program provides increased availability of higher nutritionally valued foods for children, allowing them to have better physical development and assist in improved academic performance. In the provision of this food, we allow families to have additional resources for their children while increasing the food available in the home. The percentage of families with children living in the home under the age of 18 who live below the poverty level in Lincoln County is 37.4%, and in Logan County it is 29.4%. In order to break the cycle of poverty and increase academic performance, children must have enough to eat. Statistics support that children who have adequate nutritional support perform better on tests, comprehend their academic work better, then performing better in class, are more attentive and have fewer behavioral problems. All children deserve to have enough to eat, and as much support as we can provide to them to achieve to their academic capacity.

Since our founding in 1990, Habitat for Humanity of the Tri-State (HFHTS) has constructed 153 new houses, completed 8 Veteran-owned critical home repairs, installed 23 wheelchair/accessible ramps, 4 house rehabs and 4 recycled houses (a recycle is a Habitat home that was given back to the organization, rehabbed to Habitat standards and sold to a new Habitat home buyer). To date, HFHTS has served 436 individuals with 272 being children. In September 2014, HFHTS started a first of its kind housing model (Veterans Housing Initiative - VHI) serving formerly homeless Veterans in collaboration with the Herschel "Woody" Williams VA Medical Center's Community Resource and Referral Center HUD-VASH (Veteran Affairs Supportive Housing) program. To date, HFHTS has constructed 12 VHI houses with 3 of them being recycled to serve the same population. The VHI has been recognized locally, statewide and nationally as a housing model that brings our Veterans "all of the way home" for its innovative concept to reality. In 2022, HFHTS has once again lead the way by working with the US Dept. of Veteran Affairs, US Dept. of Housing and Urban Development and Habitat for Humanity International creating a Pilot Program mirroring the VHI that includes the continuation of supportive services to our Veteran participants. In the near future, this model will be scaled out to other parts of the US.For the upcoming fiscal year, HFHTS will construct 5 new Habitat houses, rehab 2 VHI houses and complete 4 Veteran-owned critical home repair projects in Cabell and Wayne counties.

The Huntington City Mission operates a community feeding program (CFP) that began in 1939 as a soup kitchen for homeless men. Today, the CFP is the only daily congregating mass feeding project within a 50 mile radius of Huntington. In 2022,193,075 meals were served to those experiencing homelessness living in our shelters, or to the low-income community at large, an increase of nearly 8,000 meals from the year prior. The Community Feeding Program is a well established, ongoing project of the Huntington City Mission. If current trends stay in place, the Mission is on track to serve 220,000 meals this year. In addition to meals served on site, we collaborate with our local Informational and Referral service agency that will refer those housed with a voucher if a food box is needed. We distribute the food boxes once a week, with an average of 80 boxed meals provided to the community each week, filled with pantry items, meat and dairy products. The CFP is located at 1030 7th Avenue in Huntington and our program is easily accessible with public transportation. There is never a charge for any meal served. The Mission serves three meals a day Monday through Friday and two meals on Saturday and Sunday. We welcome anyone coming to our door for a meal with no questions asked. We do track demographical data such as approximate age, gender, race, and if they are a member of the community or currently a guest residing in our facilities. The CFP operates with a Kitchen Coordinator, and 3 cooks. Volunteers are welcomed to help with daily meal prep and serving. The primary goal of the CFP is to provide the basic survival need of food. We are an open door to all who are hungry. Interviews with individuals who come to the CFP for assistance demonstrate program success. Many low income community members have money to pay utilities and rent, but not enough money to buy groceries. We believe that this shows the CFP helps to further prevent more homelessness.

In addition our programs and services are designed with a holistic approach to each child. Each year, approximately 499 children between the ages of 6 and 18 participate in our Power Hour Program., which includes homework assistance, tutoring enrichment, field trips, and educational computer programs designed and implemented by certified teachers and Boys and Girls club staff. Both club locations, B.C. McGinnis in Guyandotte and Henrietta Payne in West Huntington, are in neighborhoods with higher rates of poverty and crime, which shows the value of the clubs' purpose as a safe haven, both after school and during the summer, when one or more parents or guardians maybe working or seeking employment. The club is also open during out of school days. Focusing our efforts on providing food, safety, well-being, and educational advancement of our members has led and continues to lead them to reach their full potential as productive, caring, and responsible citizens.

This program is based on the concept that the freshest food provides the best nutritional value and the finest people to raise such food are West Virginia farmers. We designed a program to reimburse the farmers using tax law and, in some instances, a micro grant to pay the farmers 100% of what they would receive after tax for their product, selling their livestock at market. The program simply seeks to reimburse a farmer 100% of what the farmer keeps "net" money after paying tax on the beef he/she sells. After selling the farm product, like all taxpayers, a farmer is taxed with federal and state income tax. Tri State refers to this as our "break even point" that the program pays "net" to the farmer. Tri State intends to use funds offered from the WV Nip Program to provide micro-grants to the farmer, as an incentive to donating their livestock to our feeding program. The availability of this program will continue to reduce the food cost budget associated with feeding the homeless of Huntington. Since August 2022, 11,353 pounds of grass fed quality beef has been donated to this program, providing a substantial savings in food cost, currently at a savings of \$77,000 in our food budget, and with the upcoming promised cattle from farmers, we feel that this will be a total savings of \$100,000 in savings for the year 2023. In 2022, our community feeding program provided 193,075 meals to the clients living inside our shelters, as well as the community at large. Since January 1, 2023, we have served 99,331 meals. Just this past month, In May 2023, we provided over 20,000 meals to those experiencing homelessness or food insecurity in the Huntington area.

Our services have become more even more intensive, focusing more on social, emotional and physical well-being rather than attendance and academics. We have adapted our program to meet the growing needs of our students through home visits, phone calls, letters home and video chats, and look to continue to adapt our program to ensure our students are safe and well.

Central WV Community Action, Inc.'s Pathways to Independence initiative provides emergency services to low-income Lewis County residents. NIP donations support customers, who are experiencing financial straits, with emergency rent or mortgage payments, utility payments, food assistance, transportation services to maintain employment, and other basic needs in an effort to avert deeper crises. Many of the agency's customers include the working poor, who live daily on the edge of being able to meet their basic needs. When income is lost due to lack of transportation, lack of available childcare, or health-related incidents, families can transition from vulnerable to in-crisis overnight. Similarly, sudden pop-up expenses, such as car repairs, the need to obtain new housing, unexpected babysitting costs, or medical/pharmacy expenses can mean the difference in paying or not paying a vital utility bill or making a rent payment. It is the agency's goal to provide transitional financial support to ensure that families can meet their basic needs and have the opportunity to thrive. While NIP-related donations provide for the cost of customer supports, the agency takes a holistic approach to assessing and meeting each customer's needs related to their overall self-sufficiency. Customers are screened by a case manager when applying for assistance, and each customer is encouraged to deepen their financial management knowledge through individualized budgeting activities. Within the agency, customers can receive long-term case management assistance, Head Start, housing services, and employment transition support. Outside referrals are made for a host of additional services as well.Lewis County families living at or below 125% of the federal poverty guidelines are the target audience for the Pathways to Independence initiative.

Hero's Haven Child Advocacy Center facilitates a multidisciplinary investigative team (MDIT) response to the investigation of allegations of crimes against children in Harrison, Barbour, Taylor, and Doddridge counties. Alleged crimes include sexual abuse, sexual assault, severe physical abuse and neglect, drug endangerment, depiction in pornography, child trafficking, and witness to violence (including homicide). The agency provides a physically and psychologically safe, child-friendly environment for the investigation of these allegations of child maltreatment, utilizing industry standard protocols. Child safety professionals from various disciplines work collaboratively so that the child only needs to disclose the details of the abuse once, minimizing further trauma caused by repeated questioning. Family advocates provide timely referrals for trauma-focused therapy as well as for specialized medical exams, and are available to the child and their protecting caregiver for ongoing support and court accompaniment throughout any judicial response. This guick, multidisciplinary team approach provides non-duplication of many services crucial to the future health and well-being of the child victim of abuse.

According to the CDC, rural Americans are more likely to die from heart disease, cancer, unintentional injury, chronic lower respiratory disease, and stroke than their urban counterparts (cdc.gov). As the third most rural state in the nation (census.gov), this poses a significant risk for West Virginians. Thirty-four of West Virginia's fifty-five counties are considered rural, and there is no doubt that the rurality of West Virginia is wreaking havoc among its people. West Virginia's heart disease mortality rate is 19% higher than the national rate. Cancer is 17% higher, while diabetes is a whopping 53% higher than the national rate. (ARC, 2017). The Emergency Medical Assistance for Doddridge and Ritchie Counties Project will improve access to healthcare for two of the top ten most rural counties in West Virginia by reducing personal and public barriers and relocating some of the free clinic's resources closer to these medically underserved areas (MUAs). Community health workers (CHWs) will serve as intermediaries between the community and the clinic to identify and remove personal barriers through cultural mediation, care coordination, coaching, advocacy, and outreach (C3project.org). A one-day-a-week clinic will be established in Doddridge County, shortening the distance to access care and adding critical capacity in an area already designated as a healthcare provider shortage area (HRSA). Other outreaches will also be employed to make healthcare more accessible, all at no cost to the resident. As a result, access to the clinic's many free services, including primary medical care, prescription medications, oral and dental healthcare, and primary eye care (PEC), should be optimized, and outcomes should be improved, enabling rural residents to live happy and productive lives that strengthen their local economies and help elevate their community out of poverty.

West Virginia social services assistance program, know as Mountain Heart, provides a subsidy to working families (families below the 125% of the federal poverty level) whose children are enrolled in our program. The Center offers afterschool and summer enrichment programs to children grades K through 5 (K-5) at three sites with an average enrollment of 100 children attending from three of the West side Middle and Capital High feeder elementary schools. Our three afterschool sites include Edgewood Elementary, Emmanuel Baptist Church, and Mary C. Snow Elementary. Each site serves approximately 30-35 children, with the intent to expand enrollment to average 50 students served per site. All program sites operate in accordance with the KCS academic year calendar with additional summer programming provided all day during summer recess. Our BALLET FOR ALL program enables financially-distressed children and families to experience the cultural and educational benefits of attending Charleston Ballet performances free of charge. Families who reside in low-income neighborhoods of Kanawha County and meet the eligibility guidelines within the 125% federal poverty line will gualify. Free tickets to Charleston Ballet performances will be available for the fall, spring, and special student performances. In addition, a scholarship study program is offered to young students (ages 4 – 16) in collaboration with the Partnership of African American Churches (PAAC) Afterschool 21st Century Learning Programs and the American Academy Ballet, the official school of the Charleston Ballet, where the children take ballet classes. Attending performances through the BALLET FOR ALL program helps reinforce the connection of their ballet education with exposure to the world of dance and the participating artists. This educational experience extends into families as well. Community arts programs build social capital by boosting one's ability and motivation to become civically engaged and increasing a sense of connection to the community—the arts impact high-risk youth by reducing delinguency and improving school performance.

Since 1990, the Childhood Language Center (CLC) has helped over 2700 children with speech, language, feeding and swallowing problems. The CLC is currently assisting 140 children from 14 different WV counties and has 13 children on its waiting list. The CLC's clients are dealing with a variety of difficulties, such as Autism Spectrum Disorders, Down Syndrome, hearing impairments, developmental delays and apraxia of speech. Research has found that there is a strong connection between a child's ability to communicate and their behavior, including behavioral, emotional and social difficulties. If a child cannot communicate with his/her outside environment, this can lead to frustration and bad behavior as the child grows. It has been calculated that it costs \$2,500 to fund a child through one year of services at the CLC, which includes 51 individual therapy sessions, the opportunity to participate in group sessions and admission to the CLC's week-long summer camp. For many families in our low-income service area the CLC is the only option for speech and language therapy because it is free to any family, unlike many programs in our service area. The Sponsor A Child program allows individuals, businesses and organizations to donate \$2,500 or more in order to ensure that all children who require communication therapy have the opportunity. The donation can be either done as a lump sum or in payments as desired. No matter how the donation is given, children who would otherwise struggle to find affordable and effective speech therapy are assisted.

We do a lot of work with family finding looking to locate potential family connections for our children. Shelters are the steppingstone to permanency, either return home, go to foster care, treatment programs and or residential programs. We are currently utilizing our independent living programs for youth aged 18 so that we can help find them an apartment, a job, or additional schooling. They each have an assigned social worker to help teach them basis living skills and to ensure they are progressing into adulthood well. This prevents them from being homeless when turning 18. Our resource centers help support families so a youth will be able to return home and have needs met. We connect all of our shelter children/youth to therapy and psychological services, while in the shelter and afterwards. Our shelter staff advocate for our children in the school system and in the court system. We strive to provide care that promotes normalcy and opportunities.

Our initial start date was delayed until early January due to a change in grantors from The Benedum Foundation to The Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation. Nevertheless, we've experienced a successful start, and continue exceeding our expectations for the program. Our program's objectives remain the same: to provide early learning curriculum, instruction, and support to children in day care and Head Start settings in Boone County. We chose Boone County because in 2022 only 31% of third grade students are proficient on state assessments, and 65.5% of the student population identified as "low socioeconomic status" (SES). The instruction is based on Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood from Fred Rogers' landmark social-emotional learning curriculum. It also uses a print rich environment to build the foundations of literacy. Children are learning a series of "strategy songs" to help manage emotions and develop key social and emotional skills while exploring, growing, and creating. Daniel Tiger's Life's Little Lessons uses the PBS Kids model of watch (video clip), play (playing games), explore (engaging in group activities), and share (communicating with families) to put children on the road to success for the future. These activities are proving to help build phonological awareness through visual aids, books, and teacher modeling. The PBS model allows children to strengthen their ability to comprehend, summarize, and make predictions. Since February children have been introduced to new topics that include new books, new games, open-ended discussion topics, and group activities designed specifically for their age group. Each new topic (each month) has strengthened concepts of print, scribble writing, pretend read, listening, questioning, retelling, etc. Ongoing Instructional support is provided by the Education staff at WVPB. Over the course of this year, our educators have observed children once disengaged, beginning to respond and participate - an overwhelming sign of success.

The Gabriel Project of WV helps babies in low-income families have a healthy, safe start in life through community-based immediate, caring assistance. Babies enter the world utterly dependent on others for their every need. For low-income families, fulfilling their baby's basic needs is a constant daily stressful struggle. Lowincome families are single parent households, wed and unwed couples, teen parents without sufficient support, and in rising numbers, kinship caregivers who unexpectedly received custody of a young relative and are unprepared to meet the child's basic needs. The Gabriel Project assists these low-income families by purchasing and directly distributing formula, diapers, clothing, cribs and car seats that are cost prohibitive for impoverished families but necessities for their young child's health and well-being. We provide services according to each family's assessed needs through our network of community church sites and trained volunteers in the 27 counties of our project area. Formula, diapers and clothing are the most urgently requested basic needs. We distribute formula to families who depleted their limited monthly public nutritional assistance allocation or to families who do not qualify for public assistance yet cannot afford to adequately feed their baby. We also distribute specialized formula to low-income families whose babies have allergies, digestive problems or other medical issues. We supply diapers and infant/toddler clothing to low-income families to keep their child comfortable and to lessen health risks. The new cribs we provide give babies a safe place to sleep and reduce risks of rollover falling, positional asphyxia or other trauma. In our project area there are infants sleeping in adult beds or in wobbly strollers or baby swings because their families cannot afford a proper crib. We also distribute new car seats to secure and protect young children from death or serious injury in motor vehicle crashes or sudden stopping.

HOPE Closets are cabinets within schools that are stocked with essential hygiene products such as shampoo, conditioner, toothbrushes, tampons, pads, etc. With the help of a school staff member, students that may not have these items at home can select what then need. The goal of the HOPE closet program is to relieve some of the stress that students experience due to inconsistencies in their home life. It will give students access to what they need in order for them to go to school confidently and be prepared to learn. HOPE closets also support school staff by giving them resources that are readily available so they can serve their students. In 2022, over 10,000 items were distributed through 54 HOPE Closets. In 2023 there are 61 active HOPE Closets with the plan to expand to Boone County and Clay County and serve 18 more schools. Here are some stories from counselors that have a HOPE Closet in their school:"A student moved into our area in the middle of the year. Her family was homeless and they didn't have anything for the child to clean themselves. Thanks to the products from the Hope Closet that student was given everything she needed to be successful in school without the distraction of obtaining hygienic products.""We have several students who say that it really helps their mom out. One student said she hadn't had conditioner in months. She was waiting for her mom to get her check.""Students always ask me if I've restocked so they can come "shop" for products. Read Aloud West Virginia will support high-need families in building healthy reading habits. We will provide high-quality reading material to children with poor access to engaging print literature, organize volunteer readers to act as "reading role models" for classes, and engage parents, grandparents, and other caregivers to help them help their children discover reading for pleasure. Even before Covid disruptions, too few West Virginia students were proficient readers by third grade, an important developmental threshold. Current data shows 58% of students are not proficient readers. The good news is that children can learn to read proficiently, even children who live in poor communities. With good intentional instruction at school, and opportunities to read for fun at home, most West Virginia children can become proficient readers by third grade. However, many families, schools, and communities do not have a reading habit. Read Aloud helps them to nurture it. Read Aloud places trained volunteer readers in classrooms to serve as a "commercial" for reading, a live reading role model. Read Aloud also distributes books in communities that need them and educates parents about the value of reading for pleasure. Research shows these conditions contribute to better reading comprehension and growth. One student in Jackson County is a perfect example. After Read Aloud's research-informed Summer Book Binge, designed to create excitement for reading, and to prevent summer learning loss, one elementary student held up his books, smiling from ear to ear, looked to the Read Aloud volunteer, and said he could not wait to "REEEEAD." His school is among several in the state where most of the students maintained, or even gained, reading proficiency during the summer.

Mentors will continue to support at-risk students until they enroll in post-secondary education. College Ambassadors will coach high school seniors and adults by supporting the college application process. The Education Alliance has received an \$803,754 grant from Volunteer West Virginia to administer the AmeriCorps program. In order to operate the program with efficacy, the Alliance must raise \$458,007 in matching funds. The Alliance requests \$15,000 in NIP credits to assist this fundraising effort.

The West Virginia Music Hall of Fame was founded in 2005 as a non-profit organization to document, preserve, and honor the contributions West Virginians have made to all genres of American music. One of the most important facets of our mission is to provide educational outreach programs to share the accomplishments of these great artists. Since the organization was founded, we have learned the value of utilizing music and the unique personal stories of these musicians to inspire and encourage students to believe in themselves and pursue their own dreams. In addition to being a motivator, music is also a great medium for reaching students who might not otherwise want to engage or listen. Our proposed NIP project expands our most engaging educational programs into high schools throughout the southern coal counties of West Virginia. The "Music Career Counseling Program" focuses on performing and non-performing career paths in the music and entertainment industries. Four music industry professionals give a brief presentation of their careers, along with a musical performance. Students are encouraged to engage and explore each career path. Information and contacts for additional research is provided to teachers and school counselors. There are two ways we can present our program to the schools: (1) schools within reasonable travel distance to our WV Music Hall of Fame and Museum of Music at the Charleston Town Center (downtown Charleston) will be provided with funds to bus students to our location, and (2) if a school is unable to arrange a field trip to Charleston, our group of music career counselors will travel to the school. Under this NIP project we will be able to increase the number of schools, students, and teachers we can reach. And by focusing on the coal-impacted counties of southern WV we will be able to reach the students in our State who can really use some creative approaches to planning a career and entering the workforce.

Food insecurity for school-age children is a growing problem in WV. Despite state and federal programs designed to eliminate food insecurity, the issue is becoming worse. Union Mission, with the help of several local schools, has identified some of the key issues causing the increase in food insecurity for school-age children. These barriers to food access can be best eliminated by putting food directly into the hands of the children that they can take home to consume during times school is not in session (evenings, weekends, holidays, etc.)School-based food pantries are the exception rather than the norm and the pantries that do exist are inadequately stocked or contain the lowest quality of food (heavily processed foods). Based on a test Union Mission conducted during the spring semester of 2023 with a local middle school that produced great results, Union Mission (and its collaborating partners) seeks to establish or improve school-based food pantries, provide equipment students need to transport food home safely, and establish protocols for the function of the pantries.Union Mission's goal is to see food insecurity be reduced in the locals schools by placing food directly in the hands of the children so they can safely and efficiently take it home to consume when school is not in session. UM desires to see food options improve as well so these children can have access to healthy, nutrient dense food and reduce consumption of processed foods. By the end of the school year, Union Mission hopes to have detailed data on the number of children assisted in each of the schools with which they partner.

United Way of Central West Virginia's Information and Referral project connects people to the resources they need, when they need it. Information and Referral provides support and assistance to those looking for non-emergent needs such as food assistance, help with utilities, rental assistance, homeless services, locating recovery support and so much more. We provide Information and Referral services to our entire six county service area: Kanawha, Putnam, Boone, Logan, Clay and Braxton counites. Our call specialists provide and maintain a data base of over 250 social service agencies that provide services to our six counties, regularly updating, adding or deleting programs as necessary. This ensures our data base is current and accurate for callers requesting assistance. Information and Referral also works with school counselors to identify low-income children who do not have adequate shoes to be safe and healthy. Once identified we provide shoes to those children at no cost directly through the school counselor. We build long lasting relationships with school personnel, allowing them to access Information and Referral for other resources as needed for their students. We use Information and Referral data to track specific needs, locate areas with specific challenges (such as food deserts) or identify unmet needs in under resourced areas. Information and Referral is zip code driven. This data can also show us areas with fewer calls, indicating additional marketing may be needed in those communities to ensure people know this valuable resource exists. Information and Referral also serves as a clearing house for Christmas assistance programs in Boone, Kanawha and Putnam counties. We work closely with approximately 30 Christmas Bureau partners to provide Christmas toys and food to families while also reducing duplication of services through this collaboration effort. Information and Referral is our trusted resource for assistance 24/7, 365 days a year.

CASA stands for Court Appointed Special Advocates. WV CASA is a nonprofit community organization responsible for developing, supporting, and strengthening local CASA programs throughout the state to assure quality volunteer advocacy for children and youth who have experienced abuse or neglect. CASA volunteers are appointed by circuit court judges to advocate for the best interests of children/youth involved in child protection cases. It is our goal to engage and empower enough CASA volunteers to serve additional counties/judicial circuits throughout the state allowing more children to directly benefit from a community advocate on their side. With this project, WV CASA aims to respond to the request from local judges, GALs, and community members to expand services to children in counties where CASA is currently unavailable. Specifically, we aim to finalize our CASA program start-up in Raleigh County and continue expansion efforts in Randolph and Barbour/Taylor counties. While these counties are our current primary focus and align with our recently developed growth plan, WV CASA remains malleable to the needs and feasibility of the communities we serve. Relationship development is underway in Monroe, Summers, and Tucker county for future CASA expansion.West Virginia currently houses 10 local CASA programs serving children in 30 counties. In FY23, CASA was only able to pair 43% of children who have experienced abuse/neglect with a carefully screened and highly trained CASA volunteer to provide individual advocacy for their specific needs. The child abuse/neglect system is overwhelmed with untenable caseloads and staffing deficits. CASA is dedicated to ensuring children do not languish in WV's foster care system.Now is the time to put resources in place to ensure that every child subjected to abuse/neglect can interact and engage with a CASA advocate who is legally sworn to represent their best interest in the courtroom.

WV Health Right, Inc. (WVHR) is the state's oldest and largest free and charitable clinic. Since its inception in 1982, WVHR has added a variety of options to its clinical services, including health education classes, which provide tobacco cessation assistance, nutrition classes, teaching kitchen classes, and classes to help individuals manage chronic diseases such as heart disease and diabetes. In 2017, WVHR launched a state-of-the-art mobile dental clinic to provide free dental care to low-income adults in five rural counties in WV (Boone, Clay, McDowell, Logan, and Roane). Through this mobile dental clinic, WVHR will provide dental care and treatment to 1,800 impoverished uninsured/underinsured adults. In partnership with various local healthcare partners in each service area, WVHR has adequate space and internet access to perform these services. These healthcare agencies also assist in identifying residents of their area who are eligible for these free dental services. Access to dental care services improves citizens' overall health status and decreases emergency room usage, which decreases the number of controlled substances prescribed for chronic tooth pain. Further, increasing oral health care access also contributes to promoting employability and economic development and stability. In addition to providing free dental services throughout rural areas, health education materials will also be provided to 1,800 adults to increase awareness for effectively managing chronic diseases and reducing habits that lead to chronic health conditions. These materials will be geared toward managing cardiovascular risks, diabetes, weight, hypertension, and tobacco cessation.

HOPE, Inc. is a private, non-profit United Way agency that is licensed by the WV Family Protection Services Board to provide shelter and outreach services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault and their families in Marion, Harrison, Lewis, Doddridge, and Gilmer counties. HOPE's emergency shelter has been in operation since 1980 and is the only shelter facility for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in our five-county area. While receiving shelter, victims receive services that ensure their safety and allow them to seek alternatives to their current situation. Last year, 106 victims were housed for 4868 nights. For most victims we serve, shelter is their last option physically, emotionally, and financially. Over the past decade, HOPE has worked to obtain a new facility. Our current facility is now completely handicapped accessible, while providing a safe, home-like environment for victims and their families. Most of our clients come to us with only the clothes on their back, so their needs are numerous. Our goal is to be able to provide our clients with the assistance they need to start fresh. This year our project will focus on providing our clients with the necessary financial assistance to make the move from shelter to a home of their own, free from abuse. To accomplish this goal, our clients need financial assistance in many different forms. The most basic forms would be rent and rental deposits, but often due to financial abuse, their needs are more numerous. They often need non-basic items such as paying to replace lost documents, a washer/dryer for those moving to rural areas with no transportation, minor car repairs so they can get to work, childcare costs until they qualify for assistance, etc. These financial needs often keep a victim from moving on from an abusive situation. Our goal at HOPE is not only to provide a safe haven for our clients, but to give them independence to survive on their own.

BARC developed the LIFE program in 2021 and began delivering in-theater lessons to Mercer County students in December of that year. The program continued during the 2022-23 school year. During those two school years, more than 3,500 students from sixteen schools in Mercer County visited the Granada Theater to participate in this education program. The LIFE program uses films as an innovative educational tool to enhance and supplement current curriculum in the public schools, including movies relevant to learning objectives in language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies. Moreover, we take the lead in directing innovative prevention programs such as Mercer County Teen Court, Kids Run the Nation, First Book, and Partners in Prevention. For example, our Teen Court program engages teenage volunteers in sponsoring and adjudicating their peers, fostering empathy and promoting the understanding of societal rules. Kids Run the Nation is a 10-week after-school program that not only promotes physical health through running but also cultivates character development, cooperation, love for oneself through the formation of healthy habits, love for the community, and leadership. The program culminates in a 5k run for the participating children. ChildLaw Services actively participates in various abuse prevention initiatives, including Body Safety courses, Listening Projects, and Youth Development programs. While a significant portion (approximately 60%) of our funding comes from fee-for-services provided by the WV Supreme Court and the Public Defender's Service, the need for our services has intensified due to the rising opioid epidemic and its impact on children. Donations from individuals, corporations, and public groups play a crucial role in enabling us to provide legal advocacy and therapeutic services to child victims of crime.

Today's students are dealing with a number of external factors that can present barriers to them completing a college degree, but the CU Foundation is committed to helping break down those barriers by providing as many scholarship dollars as possible each year to Concord students. The Maier Foundation of Charleston, West Virginia matches funds raised by the Concord University Foundation for Pathways, but in order to receive this match, Concord must raise \$60,000 by October 1 of each year. NIP credits will help the Foundation meet this goal, which will in turn help recipients of the Pathways Scholarship continue their education.

The Supplemental Charity Care Program allows individuals experiencing extraordinary circumstances, such as the sudden loss of income, a change in family dynamics, or a catastrophic health event, which are not considered as criteria under the hospital's traditional charity assistance program to be considered for financial assistance to pay for primary or emergency medical care. This program supports patients in our local community who are in the 125% poverty level range. All funds from this program are used for medical care expenses that patients incur at Princeton Community Hospital. PCH serves a multi-county area which is suffering from extreme poverty, high unemployment, and low income. For those who have insurance, they are faced with high deductibles that they cannot afford to pay, therefore many go without medical care. This program helps cover the costs of necessary medical care for those struggling in our area.

WV FUE exists to remove barriers, guide parents, and support providers through the transformation of K-12 education in the Mountain State. We recognize that not every child is best served by their local public school, and we believe we are uniquely positioned to provide support for the nonpublic infrastructure that is essential to serving families without means. We are the only WV-based organization in the state formed solely to provide navigation support to parents, connecting them to learning environments and education models that meet them where they are. From technical assistance to working with County Boards of Education on behalf of families, we are often the connecting piece that stands between a child and an opportunity that helps them reach their full potential. The projects that NIP would allow us to execute is to continue offering resources via our website, provide knowledge and resources through workshops, and to create regional committees to be the liaison between families and organizations such as WVSSAC, WVSTO, WVDE, and County Boards of Ed. Most of the families that we work with live in underserved communities with limited resources. This makes it hard to find information and understand laws that pertain to the many different educational options. Hiring a consultant or lawyer is not possible for these families and WV FUE has been successful in helping them to navigate intimidating issues that can become complex, especially since the Hope Scholarship and access to school sports for private and homeschooling students is new to both families and government organizations in WV. WV FUE is the only organization that has provided direct services to both providers and families using experience from decades of grassroots work. Over the past two years, it has become clear that there's a need in WV communities to have access to experts who can provide families with free assistance in navigating all available educational options for their children.

SARAH'S House Child Advocacy Center is a child-friendly, child-focused facility that provides a different way to investigate, treat and respond to allegations of child abuse. These allegations can include sexual abuse, physical abuse, neglect, witness to violence, drug endangerment, exposure to/depiction in child pornography, and child sexual exploitation. Children ages 3-17, who have been victimized by abuse, receive services from certified professionals who coordinate investigative responsibilities with child protective services and/or law enforcement to increase the likelihood of a successful outcome. SARAH'S House offers services to families in need regardless of their ability to pay. Parents as Teachers is an evidence-based, home visitation program providing services to families with children ages birth through kindergarten and/or prenatal. The program is voluntary and completely free. The goals of the Parents as Teachers (PAT) program are to increase parent knowledge of early childhood development and improve positive parenting practices, provide early detection of developmental delays and connection to services, improve parent, child, and family health and well-being, prevent child abuse and neglect, increase children's school readiness and success, improve family economic well-being, strengthen community capacity and connectedness. Goals are met through personalized visits and group connections. PAT visits are tailored to meet the needs of the family. Parent Educators visit with families 1-2 times a month, depending on the need. During visits, research-based information is shared on important topics such as parent-child interaction, child development, development-centered parenting, and family well-being. PAT also hosts group connections for enrolled families and the community to attend. Group connections provide hands-on learning activities, opportunities for socialization with other parents and children, and having fun.

The Community Trust Foundation, in collaboration with the Aging and Family Services of Mineral County (AFSMC), is supporting the Meals on Wheels program in Mineral County through an established endowed fund. This endowment will assure the long-term sustainability of the Meals on Wheels program which, despite being crucial to the well-being of more and more low-income Mineral County senior citizens, continues to be increasingly underfunded. This Meals on Wheels program is a community-based, emergency assistance program that serves primarily low-income senior citizens in the economically distressed area of Mineral County. West Virginia. Meals on Wheels is a service designed to assist frail, elderly shut-ins by providing them with one well-balanced, nutritious, hot meal, five days per week. This program is for those who cannot cook for themselves, have no one to cook for them, and are unable to leave their homes for meals. The service allows people to stay in their homes, maintain some independence, and avoid living in costly institutions – a financial benefit to the client and the community. A Meals on Wheels delivery also provides a reassuring "check-in" for those who live alone. Any unanswered delivery is reported and investigated. Changes in a recipient's health or needs are noted so that dietary changes can be made or appropriate referrals to family, physician, or other community services are arranged. NIP Tax Credits to this program go to relieving the hunger deficit of needy senior citizens and assuring the long-term sustainability of this vital program. As the endowment grows in perpetuity, 4% of the market value is used by the AFSMC to assist in feeding the low-income elderly. After 10 years we expect the endowment to hold \$100,000 minimum, providing \$4000+ each year for the agency to address senior hunger and isolation.

The Christian Help (CH) direct & emergency support services are provided free-of-charge to facilitate financial stability for individuals & families in, and to avoid, crisis situations. This includes grants-in-aid; vocational assistance; daily & maternity clothes, outerwear, footwear; infant/children needs; household items, small appliances, linens; and food pantry orders. If clients have an unexpected shortage, the CH emergency financial assistance (EFA) program can help. Grants may be for identification documents critical to securing employment and benefits; or, to help pay a bill. CH EFA underwrites utilities, shelter, transportation, medical, and/or personal (e.g., birth certificates & IDs) needs. During CY22, we served 845 households with \$110,929 in monetary aid. Confirmation of need (i.e., billing statement, invoice) and legal right (e.g., account, vehicle, homeowner), as well as voucher acceptance from the involved vendor is required. Our network of vendors is extensive, and our reputation and payment record with them is stellar. The CH Food Pantry (FP) and Free Store (FS) programs provide direct aid via donated in-kind products to help meet client needs and off-set financial shortfalls. During CY22, the CH FP served 790 households; and, the FS served 8,314 shoppers, plus 2,319 special and vocation needs at \$18,688 direct cost. Base physical needs, such as food, undergarments, toiletries, clothing, and shoes, as well as survival blankets, hot hands and feet pads were given to our most vulnerable (i.e., homeless, low-to-moderate income) residents. CH does more than simply help with finances. Our counselor is an education resource and referral service for clients seeking aid. We listen to each unique situation and offer the most beneficial resources. Whether the resource is one of our programs or another agency's, no client leaves without the full support we can offer. Individual stability supports family stability which supports community stability.

The Robinson Street Affordable Housing project consists of three (3) single-family homes which will be built in Fairmont, Marion County, WV. Scheduled to begin late Summer 2023, these three-bedroom, 2-bath homes will be completed within twelve months. The project's goal is to provide three (3) families from the Fairmont area with safe, affordable homes and help revitalize a neighborhood that is considered blighted. Families and individuals apply for the Homeownership Program, and are selected based upon their housing need, ability to assume a 30-year, zero-percent interest mortgage and willingness to partner with Mon Valley Habitat for Humanity. This partnership includes completing 250 hours of "Sweat Equity" for each individual 18 and over in the family; these hours may include work on a construction site, completing homeownership and financial education courses, working in the Morgantown ReStore and promoting the Homeownership Program to potential applicants. Partner families, upon completion of the Homeownership Program, assume a zero-percent affordable mortgage which is calculated on their ability to pay.

To generate awareness of MVHFH and the Robinson Street Affordable Housing Project, three Community Improvement grants of \$1,000 each will be awarded to groups selected through an application process. These projects may include neighborhood improvements such as painting, landscaping, or accessibility enhancements.

Hazel's House of Hope is a 108,000 square foot former hotel, which has been repurposed as a facility that can support the needs of the most vulnerable populations in our area. Hazel's House of Hope and its partnering agencies aim to address three major public health issues afflicting the vulnerable populations in our community: the high and increasing population of people suffering from homelessness, an increase in the number of individuals struggling to maintain food security, and spikes in substance abuse and fatal overdoses in Monongalia County. Scott's Run Settlement House's (SRSH) Backpack Feeding Program provides food for the weekend to children who rely on school meals as their primary source of nutrition and experience food insecurity. Each week SRSH delivers bags containing two breakfast items, two lunch items, two dinner items, two snacks, and one fruit item to the schools who then distribute them to the children enrolled in the program. Beginning in 2011 with 100 children participating at one school, the program has grown to serve over 500 children at 9 schools. The benefits of this program are quite substantial. Surveys from both parents and teachers indicate a positive impact in the children's mental, emotional, and physical health in addition to improved academic performance. Specifically, 78% of parents reported an improvement in their child's overall mood and behavior while 72% of teachers reported improved attention in class. The additional nourishment the program provides allows children to develop properly and decreases the stress associated with childhood food insecurity. The cost of this program is roughly \$150 per child, per school year. This reflects food costs alone and does not include transportation or staff expenses. For the 2022 - 2023 school year, SRSH's food cost will be approximately \$75,000. Additional funding will not only allow SRSH to continue to provide for hundreds of children in need, but it will also allow healthier foods to be purchased. With your support our program will continue to evolve and expand to ensure no child goes hungry.

There is a tremendous need for before and after school programs as a supplemental offering to children and families in our community. Programs like the Shack's provide children of high risk the opportunity to have additional one on one tutoring. Additionally, children need a safe place to be active and engaged after being restricted to sitting down most of the day. The Shack's before and after-school programs are offered throughout the school year and provide a safe environment for children grades K-5 to receive academic support, recreation, nutritional and social enrichment. The education component consists of programming that include art, STEM, physical activity and reading. The physical education component of this program affords children a place to release their energy and decompress. We will be adding a walking/miles club incentive with our physical activity program allowing children to earn charms for milestones met. It is important that we provide safe, affordable care to working parents and to bridge academic growth during the summer. The Shack offers a summer camp with a unique venue for growth, as it allows kids to become independent and self-confident, while socializing and making new friends, and even learning new skills. Summer Slide is an issue especially for those students from low-income families. A study conducted by NWEA showed that children in 3rd to 5th grades lost about 20 percent of their school-year gains in math during summer. We have incorporated reading, math, art, and science programs in our camp to keep the children engaged and on track over the summer. During the 2022 Summer program many students received scholarships to be able to attend. Most of the students who attended this program attend Mason Dixon Elementary and Mylan Park Elementary, both of which have free/reduced lunch assistance percentages above the State average of 51.4%.

The West Virginia Fund for Law in the Public Interest's summer project sends current West Virginia University College of Law students into the field to serve the unmet legal needs of the poor. Our postgraduate project does the same, but with graduating students who will serve as full-time lawyers. These students and graduates address the legal needs of the poor by working in non-profit organizations throughout West Virginia that serve low-income clients in the areas of housing law, disability rights, family law, consumer law, and domestic violence. In 2024, our summer project will fund at least 15 law students; these students will each work full-time for 10 weeks. Our post-graduate fellowship program will fund one law graduate; that fellow will work full-time for one year.Since the WV Fund's inception in 1987, our fellows--each of whom has completed a competitive selection process--have provided thousands of their fellow West Virginia citizens with the free legal help that they so desperately need. Specifically, the WV Fund has funded over 549 summer fellows who have served low income clients, primarily in civil legal aid offices. Since 2008, the WV Fund has funded 26 full-time, postgraduate fellows who have also served low-income West Virginians with complex legal needs. Their work helps their clients escape domestic violence, retain safe housing, protect their children, and obtain relief from fraudulent consumer debt collection practices.Summer fellows and post-graduate fellows serve clients by providing them with direct legal representation, by giving them legal advice and information, by referring them to needed resources, by conducting legal research on their behalf, and by creating written informational pieces designed to educate them about their rights and options. Our student fellows work under the supervision of licensed attorneys. Our post-graduate fellows begin work once they have passed the bar exam and become licensed attorneys.

The Helpful Harvest Program was implemented in May of 2020 to address the increased need in food insecurity in Monongalia and Preston counties. In addition to addressing food insecurity, the program has a significant impact on employee retention and job creation for people with disabilities, those in substance abuse recovery, the discouraged workforce, and our veterans. The program also disrupts entrenched norms of food pantries providing unhealthy, nutritionally insufficient foods to those in need because of the food's affordability and availability. By providing healthy food options to pantries and feeding programs, we are not only addressing the immediate needs of those experiencing food insecurity, but also helping to address the long-term health issues faced by our communities. The program operates out of Preston County Workshop and at Hazel's House of Hope serving approximately 48 feeding programs and 9,000 individuals monthly. Both locations provide a food storage facility and distribution center. We purchase meat, produce and dairy from local farms, which in turn supports the local agricultural economy. The processing kitchen at Preston County Workshop will begin operations this summer. Produce purchased from local farms will be processed and stored to provide nutritious foods year-round for those experiencing food insecurity in our communities and schools. Classes on food processing and nutrition will be offered to encourage food security and self-sufficiency.

The Injury Prevention and Safety Program at WVU Medicine Children's is committed to improving the health and safety indicators for children across the state of West Virginia. Unintentional injuries are the leading cause of death and disability of children in the United States, and most are predictable and preventable. Education, age-appropriate safety items, and home safety modifications are proven to reduce injuries and deaths, but many West Virginia families are not able to afford these measures. Our program is a statewide initiative which provides resources and support to families, both in the hospital and community, aiming to support families with incomes less than 125% below federal poverty level. These families come from every county in our state including the 33 counties the Appalachian Regional Commission ranked as distressed or at risk in FY2023. Services are provided to families in the hospital after a baby is born or when a child is admitted with an unintentional injury, during community events like baby fairs and car seat checks, when a community partner requests assistance, or when a family calls or reaches out through social media. Our program also targets childcare centers, parenting groups, foster care agencies and clinics to help improve outreach and accessibility throughout West Virginia. Education is provided on car seat use and installation, safe sleep, shaken baby prevention, neonatal abstinence syndrome, and home childproofing to prevent injury. Age-appropriate child safety items, such as car seats, booster seats, play yards, specialty car seats, locking medicine boxes and home safety kits are provided to families meeting low-income guidelines or in a time of need. Our Injury Prevention and Safety team is comprised of National Child Passenger Safety Technicians and Registered Nurses who stay current on best practice to help keep children safe and serve as a resource across the state.

Appalachian Outreach, Inc. ("AOI") is a non-profit, poverty relief organization that assists people experiencing poverty and disaster in Ohio, Marshall and Wetzel Counties in West Virginia. We believe in the dignity of every person and we've been working to ease the burden of poverty in our state for 23 years by fulfilling unmet basic human needs. AOI gathers and transports donated materials to poverty- and disaster-stricken residents of its service area. At our thrift store Hidden Treasures we accept and distribute donations of furniture, clothing, household items and hygiene products. The store is in the heart of South Wheeling, a community with many needs that is central to other parts of the community. The funds from the donated materials sells in its thrift shop Hidden Treasures offset operating costs. These sales items include clothing, furniture and household items. But AOI distributes any of these donated items plus school supplies, personal hygiene items and packs of new underwear and socks at no cost to people who need them. AOI delivers items to remote areas of its three-county service area to provide necessities that are not covered by SNAP benefits, but even more, furniture, clothing and household items that have been donated to AOI and are stored in the AOI warehouse. To assess individual needs, AOI distributes on the truck for the scheduled monthly delivery along with a full array of personal care items including shampoo, deodorant, soap, shaving items, dental care items, feminine hygiene items, toilet paper, laundry detergent, dish detergent, bathroom cleaner, disinfecting wipes, diapers and wipes and school supplies. (They are all items that cannot be purchased with SNAP benefits.)

Catholic Charities West Virginia (CCWVa) will use Neighborhood Investment Program tax credits to raise funds in support of its emergency assistance and case management programs. The emergency assistance program provides financial support to income eligible clients facing eviction or utility service termination. Assistance may also include financial help to fill prescriptions; provide gas for transportation to medical appointments or job interviews; or for alternate sources of heating like firewood, kerosene oil and propane. Additionally, food assistance may be provided. Income eligibility is defined as households whose income falls at or below 150% of Federal Poverty Guidelines. Elients who receive emergency or basic needs assistance often transition into CCWVa's case management program. Case management services go beyond meeting an immediate need to help families improve their health and well-being, and ultimately their long-term stability. Services involve a trained professional sitting down with a family to identify their strengths and weaknesses. Based on these, the clients set goals then meet regularly to work on steps to achieve those goals. The service offerings are comprehensive in nature, and can help clients address a number of obstacles that may be preventing them from breaking the cycle of poverty. These services include one-on-one coaching, financial assistance to help with employment and education, and programs to increase knowledge and skills.

Frequently, we see our elderly and individuals with disabilities fall through the cracks; the money needed to pay bills (medical and utilities, food and medicine) overshadow the costs associated with transportation to doctor's appointments or grocery shopping and many do not have family or friends available to help. The program provides support and services that help older adults and individuals with disabilities remain independent. Transportation is crucial to ensure access to essential services such as medical care and grocery shopping. FIAC provides a network of volunteers who offer flexible transportation for shopping, doctors' appointments, recreation, and other activities. One-way, round-trip, and multi-stop rides are available. The program provides lovel soft assistance from opening doors and providing verbal guidance, to physical support. The strength of the program lies in the residents of the community; volunteer caregivers come together from all neighborhoods to help their neighbors throughout Marshall and Ohio Counties.

Traditionally, after making an abuse allegation, children are moved from agency to agency and endure multiple interviews, which create additional trauma of having to retell the circumstances of the abuse over and over. Harmony House is a Children's Advocacy Center (CAC), and our project is to provide a comprehensive, child-focused program based in a facility, a CAC, that allows prosecutors, law enforcement, child protection services staff, medical & mental health professionals, and victim advocates to work together to strengthen Ohio and Marshall counties response to child abuse. The project is to ensure that no child is further victimized by systems designed to protect them and their well-being is the first priority. Since 1995, West Virginia has shown a steady incline in the cases of adult diabetes and obesity. Currently, the State is ranked #1 in the Country for adult obesity, #6 for child obesity in low-income children between 2 - 4 years old (which is an improvement from #2 in 2022), #1 for obesity in adolescent children (aged 10 to 17 years old) and #2 in high school age children (http://stateofchildhoodobesity.org). WV ranks #1 in adults with obesity, diabetes and hypertension. In order to prevent that number from continuing to rise, nutrition education is important in a young child's life. We continue to use a variety of ways to teach and promote healthy eating at the Center. Our outdoor garden provides the Center with tomatoes, peppers, squash and cucumbers. The Center follows the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) and continues to be part of Keys 4 Healthy Kids, a program that provides tools and resources on proper nutrition for the children, staff and families we serve. This program also teaches the staff how to implement change and encourages children to try new foods. We continue to focus on a fresh food menu and keep processed foods to a minimum. Tax credits awarded for 2024 will continue these efforts, educate children on the benefits of healthy eating habits and provide healthy meals to the children.

The LIFE HUB is a public, private, and nonprofit collaborative located in Wheeling, West Virginia, focused on serving adults and families who are homeless and in need of a 24/7/365 low-barrier shelter, coordinated social services, permanent housing, employment, education, as well as mental and physical healthcare in one safe place. The Upper Ohio Valley has been blessed with several social service agencies and faith-based organizations dedicated to providing resources within their mission to assist the poor and homeless. The LIFE HUB will act as the conduit to coordinate the efforts into a whole community approach. The LIFE HUB was created as a 501c3 nonprofit organization in October 2022, as a program of the Wheeling Housing Authority partnering with the City of Wheeling. The program will provide wraparound services under one roof to help the homeless strategically and compassionately navigate through a variety of systems that include housing, employment, education, health, and mental health to ensure a rapid response to basic emergent needs. Strategic planning is underway to coordinate services rapidly to ensure people are not sleeping in unsafe conditions. Navigating the complexities of mental health, poverty, physical health, addiction, unemployment, and even end of life care are profound. The care coordination is of utmost importance to serve individuals with dignity and respect. The First English Lutheran Church in downtown Wheeling was recently purchased with the support of individual and foundation donations to become the location for the services. A new building will be built over the existing parking lot to become the future 24/7/365 shelter. Historical and New Market Tax Credits will be pursued for the project. During the Winter of 2023-24, the church building will be used as the temporary shelter. The LIFE HUB operated the Winter Shelter this past year in the Catholic Charities building and served over 250 unduplicated individuals.

Access to the Parks offers each low-income child in Ohio County (WV), along with an accompanying parent, free admission to activities at Oglebay and Wheeling Park year around, where they can reap the physical, mental, educational and social benefits of spending time outdoors in the parks. Included are all recreational and educational options (including related equipment) such as swimming, golf and miniature golf, tennis, boating, fishing, ice skating, skiing, and visits to the zoo, museums and nature education center. Interested families register and receive passes valid for one year. Without "Access," many low-income children would not have the chance to engage in these healthy, social and mentally stimulating activities due to their families' inability to pay. Orchard Park Hospital (OPH) is a non-profit acute care mental health hospital serving children and adolescents in the Northern Panhandle of West Virginia and throughout the state. More than 40 professional staff will provide short-term, acute crisis treatment for at-risk youth. Orchard Park Hospital reduces the burden on emergency rooms across the tri-state area to provide immediate care to the most urgent cases. Orchard Park Hospital is located in the former Robert C. Byrd Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health Center. The Children's Home of Wheeling purchased the building and spearheaded renovations that include a new commercial kitchen and upgraded safety features. The Hospital will open in August 2023. Children and teens will be treated in a secure 30-bed facility according to age and cared for by trained medical staff. The average length of stay is eight days but can vary from four days to two weeks depending on patient needs. Treatment includes individual, group, and family therapy, workshops to learn coping skills, craft-making, indoor and outdoor play time. Communication with schools and counselors are apart of the follow-up care plan. The \$10 million facility meets the need for urgent care amidst a rapidly growing mental healthcare crisis among children and teens vulnerable to the stresses of modern society – much of it played out via social media that is all too available to children on their electronic devices. This, combined with the Covid-19 lockdown, was a particularly difficult time for WV youth, resulting in emergency room visits jumping from 2,000 to 3,000 during that time. Orchard Park Hospital, LLC, is a non-profit subsidiary of The Children's Home of Wheeling, Inc. Location is 2211 Eoff Street, Wheeling, the facility was built in 2009 as the Robert C. Byrd Child and Behavioral Health Center and was formerly part of now closed Ohio Valley Medical Center Complex. The Children's Home of Wheeling has served youth in the area since 1870.

The Seeing Hand Association offers free screening for Glaucoma at local low income high rises and senior centers in each of the counties in our catchment area. We are expanding more educational programs to these low income high raises through vision loss prevention discussions and Healthy Eye Discussions. The Seeing Hand Association has implemented a health and wellness program for their visually impaired and blind employees and clients which includes exercise classes and mental health trainings for the visually impaired in the Upper Ohio Valley.

St. John's Home for Children (St. John's Home) in Wheeling, West Virginia, has been providing care and meeting basic needs for at-risk children for 167 years-longer than West Virginia has been an independentstate. From the 19th to 21st century, the agency has continued its mission to help traumatized children move forward to a life of hope and potential. In 1856, Bishop Richard V. Whelan, the first Bishop of the RomanCatholic Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, brought three orphans to the Sister's of St. Joseph for care. This small step marked the beginning of St. John's and St. Vincent's Homes. Operated for decades by the sisters, St. John's Home has served thousands of children. In 1984 St. John's Home became an independent 50Ic (3) non-profit operating as a nationally accredited WV-licensed residential program serving boys ages 6 to 12 from throughout the state with behavioral or emotional difficulties. St. John's Home has expanded its trauma-sensitive therapy via community outreach and providing prevention services aimed at keeping children in their homes whenever possible. St. John's Home is part of a Continuum of Care that strives to eliminate abuse and neglect-as well as the effects of abuse-one child, one family, one community at a time. We have two youth emergency shelters (ages 8-17) and a Transitional Living Program (TLP) for youth aging out of foster care or experiencing homelessness (ages 17-21). YSS also provided services to homeless and street youth in the community. In FY 2022, YSS served 49 youth in our emergency shelters, 28 in Transitional Living Program and 29 in our recovery homes. This year we have increased our staff in both emergency shelters, we are expanding our TLP in our community plus opened a Recovery Resource & Help Center which is the home of the new YSS Post Overdose Response Team. Over the past 11 years, the efforts of YSS have expanded to helping adults and families.Individuals who are homeless and out in the elements have basic needs which need to be met. YSS reduces their vulnerability and improves their quality of life. Staff and community partners help to track down birth certificates, help with first month's rent or a month's rent to people and their families from becoming homeless, assist with furnishings through our Sophie Moses Free Store and stocking their pantry with basic food from our food pantry. Finally, for people in recovery from substance use disorder who need housing, YSS offers housing in one of our three recovery homes. Clients live among peers and work together on their education and/or employment and recovery. The community supports YSS through the donations, volunteers (including our Board of Directors and Emeritus Board), participation in our fundraising efforts providing material needs- clothing, blankets, house hold items, shoes and toiletries.

High Rocks offers camp free to girls across the state to ensure that kids from every financial spectrum are represented. High Rocks reach goes beyond our campground. We run college access trips and a leadership program. These programs provide one-on-one mentoring, tutoring, college trips, service-learning overnights, enrichment events, community outreach, leadership roles, and advocacy. High Rocks coordinates State Legislature trips, allowing students to speak with their representatives and partner with other organizations as opportunities arise to teach relevant topics to their communities.

Coming to us through various channels, neither they nor their families usually have the means to afford treatment, but these men and women are worth rescuing!Over the 12 months of our residential programs, they are given the skills and time needed to rebuild their lives and escape the enslavement of SUDs in a safe, closed-campus environment. Our strong Aftercare Program and close-knit recovery community with transition housing units, graduated rent (beginning at \$0), transportation, and mentoring help ensure continued recovery and a successful reentry into society. Mike's addiction was consuming him and his family. After 17 years, his wife finally said, "Enough", and had to move on: Mike had lost his wife and his girls. Eventually he came to Brian's Safehouse where he learned to think of others. He sets boundaries, copes with triggers that can cause relapse, and has built a work ethic that will provide for himself and his daughters. He paid off his fines, got his driver's license back, and sorted out child support. He is part of his daughters' lives, visiting with them and watching them in their sports activities as often as he can. Mike wants to serve others in addiction and is currently considering whether to take the Leadership Training track in the Aftercare program or to remain in the job he has with a graduate of the Safehouse. He has good choices ahead of him, and despair is no longer part of his life. Hope and Healing: Scholarships for Substance Use Disorders has brought freedom to Mike and many others and will continue to bring freedom to men and women, lifting them out of poverty, hopelessness, and even lives of crime and raise them up to live lives of purpose and productivity. Health and healing CAN come to them and their loved ones; families can be restored and the cycle of addiction and despair broken. There IS hope for addiction!

This children's bereavement camp is expected to serve 35 children in a secure and nurturing atmosphere with activities led by licensed professionals. Recognizing that each child's personal loss is unique, the camp staff provides a safe environment where grieving children receive comfort and support to facilitate the healing process. They form lasting friendships and enjoy activities that encourage them to be kids. Camp is scheduled to last 3 days and will be held at Glade Springs Resort, which offers an array of fun activities, including bowling, laser tag, and swimming. At the same time, participants will receive therapeutic engagement opportunities such as storytelling, arts, journaling, group discussions, and interactive group exercises such as solutions basket, yarn-web, and "what helps/what hurts." Camp Hope offers children who have experienced the loss of a loved one the opportunity to understand both the individualistic nature of grief and to connect with peers who are also working through loss. Attendees are able to express their grief in a safe, non-judgmental environment, focusing on their own unique healing process rather than being told how they should grieve. Camp Hope uses engagement techniques coupled with best practice models to support children. This program directly affects the lives of hurting young people in a positive way. Southern WV counties have been ravaged with loss from the opioid epidemic, with WV leading the nation in the highest rate of overdose deaths. The need for bereavement services in our four county service area is critical. True to its name, Camp Hope gives hope in terms of positivity and mental health support for children; the program is a positive step away from the ingrained practice of false bravado and neglecting self. Camp Hope acknowledges that grief is a difficult process of the human condition, but healing is possible.

Davis & Elkins College has a long history of serving first-generation and low-income students. The College was founded in 1904 to create access to education for the citizens of Elkins, WV and the rural Appalachian region surrounding it. In keeping with that tradition, the Highlands Scholar Program debuted in 2009 to make private higher education affordable to students in surrounding counties by providing scholarships to students who have a minimum 2.5 GPA. This segment of the program's original 7-county region comprises the current Highlands Scholars Regional Program. These low-income students are often 1st-generation high school graduates and 1st-generation college students, and this program ensures them access to a private college within their home state at a reasonable tuition rate. Average awards are \$19,000 for residential students and \$16,000 for commuting students (\$76,000 / \$64,000 for four years respectively), making the dream of a college degree accessible and affordable. To date D&E has invested over \$41.9 million in 1,983 Highlands Scholar recipients. Last year,161 enrolled from this 7-county region, and this year to date 114 are enrolled, with more enrolling almost daily. At D&E students find small classes and a nurturing community, increasing their likelihood of academic and personal success. D&E believes that while a college education provides value for a lifetime, students shouldn't have to spend a lifetime paying for it. With the Highlands Scholar Regional Program, D&E provides deserving low-income students in the local region with an opportunity to receive a quality, private education at an affordable price close to home. This unique program will continue to have a positive impact on our young people, ensuring the best opportunity for WV to thrive in the future.

The Preservation Alliance of West Virginia (PAWV) is seeking donations to support its newest program - "Hands-on Historic Trades Camps" – dynamic, interactive educational programs to introduce young people to careers in historic preservation trades. The goal of this program is to engage and begin training the next generation of historic trades professionals in West Virginia.Our state and nation are facing a major shortage of construction workers, most especially skilled historic trades workers, leading to deferred maintenance and delayed redevelopment projects. According to a 2019 survey by the Associated General Contractors of America, 80% of construction firms reported having difficulty in filling craft positions that represent the bulk of the construction workforce. Similarly, a survey by the National Association of Home Builders found 82% of respondents expected labor shortages to be their top issue in 2019. The skilled labor shortage has only been exacerbated by the pandemic.Through its Preservation Trades Task Force, created in 2020, PAWV identified outreach to young people as a major priority, as they are our future workers, and we hope to help guide them into well-paying and secure jobs in the historic trades. We intend to do this by partnering with existing groups, such as 4-H, the scouts and vocational schools, to offer free, interactive programs that will teach participants about traditional tools, building safety, historic trades skills, and how to pursue a career in historic trades. By engaging our youth, we are securing the future of our neighborhoods, downtowns, and places being revitalized across West Virginia.

Since 1992, the Upshur Cooperative Parish has assisted local residents with meeting basic needs including food, shelter and warmth. On average, we serve 80-100 families per week with food pantry groceries, rent/utility assistance, medical costs and more. In 2022, we provided food to more than 2,600 low-income families in Upshur County. To combat food insecurity, emergency food packages typically include food for five days per household. Our food pantry also supplies hygiene products, cleaning supplies and diapers. We offer free takeout lunches every Wednesday and Friday, and we provide clothing vouchers for our thrift store. For rent, utilities, or other financial assistance, we cover up to \$200 per family (paid directly to vendor). We work closely with other agencies in our region to make sure needs are met and utility shutoffs and evictions are prevented.Requests for our services have dramatically increased since the beginning of the pandemic. More recently, with the elimination of extra SNAP dollars and higher costs for food, we have witnessed a surge in families asking for food. Takeout lunches used to serve 30-40, now we serve 50-60 at every free meal. Demand for other services/programs such as holiday meal boxes and backpacks filled with school supplies have increased 25% or more in the last year.Meeting basic needs remains our primary focus. We especially want to insure our children and youth have food and other necessities. Our continued partnership with NIP will secure additional funds for our special programs and services, including holiday meal boxes, takeout lunches, backpacks filled with school supplies, and more - all of which are in addition to our regular, monthly food packages and rent/utility assistance.

Recreational Activities for Golden Girl Group HomeGolden Girl Group Home houses 24 girls ages 12-18 who have been sexually abused, neglected and abandoned. The girls have been taken out of their homes and brought to us to live, grow and heal. Unfortunately, funding for recreational activities is not available for our girls. Research shows that girls who have been victimized (especially sexually) show an increase in positive behaviors due to a variety of recreational activities for them to engage in. It is increasingly expensive, especially with the current national inflation, for 24 girls throughout the year, and the availability of volunteers and donor designations for these are slim. The recreational activities include membership to the local YMCA, stretching which involves trauma sensitive moves that increases self-esteem and confidence in the girls, an annual camping trip which includes wildlife educational activities and cultural arts enrichment. The variety of activities along with the extra staff cost to oversee these activities are a necessity. The girls that come to live at Golden Girl Group Home are traumatized and come from poverty stricken homes. The stipend received for the girls does not cover recreation. The combination of poverty and abuse creates such a bondage within the hearts of the girls that is shows in their behaviors and all aspects of their lives. Consistency and a variety of fun, rewarding and educational activities significantly helps in the healing process and produces more positive behaviors. According to "The Journal of Abnormal Psychology" children especially adolescents that have Post Traumatic Stress Disorder caused by abuse and neglect benefit tremendously from consistent "fun" and "diverse" recreational activities. The release of stress due to trauma through therapeutic play is not only beneficial in immediate behaviors it has been proven to provide long term positive results in the future.

Habitat homeowners work alongside community volunteers to build their home. Access to affordable housing is a challenge for many low-income families in our community. Housing that is available is oftentimes substandard. Habitat's affordable homeownership program is a solution to address the rising cost of housing in our communities. Appointments will be required to ensure adequate staff resources are available to provide safe care for each of the animals being altered. For eighteen months, the Parkersburg Art Center has worked to involve residents over age 55 in art instruction. The local reception to the program has been beyond our expectations! Many older residents do not have the opportunity or finances to join their peers in learning and socializing. Research—both formal investigation and in our experience—shows that older individuals who suffer from isolation do not thrive mentally and socially. The need for this program is shown by the wailting lists we've had for previous sessions, far exceeding the class limits. A space has been created especially for these students. Their access and work space is barrier-free. This year will expand the number of students that can be enrolled to 96. Starting with the next classes, the space created for these students will be available to any student enrolled at any time the Art Center is open to the public. They may work on their projects, and as team-work is assigned, they will have a place to work together. If they find it necessary to allow works to dry before taking the next step they will leave the project in their assigned area to dry. The Art Center will provide instruction, and supplies. The instructor will also show students inexpensive materials that they have access to at home. Experience in previous sessions, and during this year, will guide the instructor in developing lesson plans and identify materials needed for future classes.

While there was lots of mentoring and will continue to be, we want to be more intentional in growing moms (and dads) as parents and people when they make use of our baby boutique. BrightCourse will give us the opportunity to educate moms and dads (biological or not) to be the best parent they can be! Lessons cover topics from pregnancy to birth to infancy to toddlers to parenting to life-skills to fatherhood. Each course includes an online video, video worksheet, homework, a fact sheet, and a spiritual application, if desired. Course examples include Emotions of Pregnancy, Bonding with Your Unborn, Smoking/Drinking/Drugs, Simple Infant Care, Stable Parent/Stable Home, and Being a Father/Real Time. There will be no cost for the curriculum and no cost for the baby and maternity items to participants. The boutique is filled day after day with community donations and manned by volunteers. Baby showers inundated with diapers, wipes, onesies, and anything a baby would use are received. Larger items like cribs and car seats are earned by mom/dad participating in BrightCourse, prenatal care visits, pediatrician visits, obtaining a GED, and more. We are excited about this new program! We are setting a goal of 50 participants the first year and will build upon that in subsequent years.
