Each summer, Heart and Hand House facilitates the completion of critical home repairs for low-income, Barbour County families to improve the quality and safety of their living conditions. This year we have 9 volunteerwork teams that are involved in the projects, which may include, but are not limited to: roof replacement or repair to eliminate leaking and related home damage; repair or replacement of damaged flooring to eliminate safety hazards; plumbing installation or repairs to enable running water in the home; electrical work to repair unsafe wiring or to connect power to the home; and installation of wheelchair ramps and other accessibility features to accommodate household members with disabilities. In addition to the repair projects, our volunteer teams generally construct one new home per year or build substantial additions onto existing structures to accommodate growing families and eliminate overcrowding.

Monies from the NIP program will help several hundred people avoid homelessness.CCAP/L&F will also improve the quality of life for many residents by assisting in restoring their electricity and water service/or preventing shut-off of these services.

Hot meals are prepared fresh daily and delivered mid-day Monday - Friday with weekend meals delivered on Fridays upon request. The daily home visit serves as a LIFELINE for all recipients who live alone and are isolated. Our office maintains emergency contact information on each client so that if our driver's find an unsafe situation, we are able to immediately notify the families. We save lives!

The Boys & Girls Club of the Eastern Panhandle provides after school and summer programming to over 800 children in Berkeley, Jefferson, and Morgan Counties. Members receive daily access to programs in five core areas: education and career development; character and leadership development; health and life skills; the arts; and sports, fitness, and recreation. We recognize that we can make a greater impact in our members' futures with programs targeting positive youth development. Our primary focus is engaging our most needy population by providing scholarships to 50 children who are at or below the federal poverty level. As part of their scholarship, members will be matched with a mentor who provides one on one support and guidance. Currently, over seventy-five percent of our membership falls below the FPL. An annual membership per child is \$3,200. This is the cost to provide services, however, this is not what our members are responsible to pay. Community investment through grants, corporations, and individual donations help to support our members' annual fees. A nominal tuition fee per child is assessed to the member family. To assist our most needy families, a sliding tuition scale is offered and in some cases, full sponsorship is provided. We respectfully request NIP credits to support the unfunded portion of a child's membership, which is \$1,000 per child. Funding 50 members comprises 4% of our total membership.

West Virginia faces the highest per capita rate of children in foster care, according to the Annie E. Casey Foundation. This is particularly evident in the counties of the Eastern Panhandle, where nearly 800 children aged 0-18 are removed from their homes due to abuse and neglect and navigating the court and child welfare system. The shortage of foster families compounds the challenges these vulnerable children endure, often resulting in distant placements. Child welfare professionals prioritize kinship placements to minimize trauma and maintain familial and cultural ties, as they offer the best environment for overall well-being. However, many kinship caregivers lack adequate support and resources, hampering their ability to meet placement criteria and provide necessary care. Insufficient resources exacerbate stress and hinder long-term placement success. CASA-EP addresses these pressing issues through the "Make it Happen" Fund, establishing emergency resources to assist families or close family friends in meeting state requirements for kinship placements. This fund swiftly provides essential items and services, reducing the need for foster care. Provisions often include but are not limited to beds, car seats, household supplies, diapers, clothing, transportation, and medical supplies. Experts universally advocate for familial settings, within the child's community, as the optimal environment for the child's ability to thrive, be it through relatives or foster homes, as opposed to institutional settings. In the event a child is institutionalized or placed in a group setting, they often have no one to offer assistance with items needed. CASA-EP also utilizes these funds to ensure the child has the necessary items for comfort and security in an unfamiliar setting. This includes providing essential items to enhance the child's well-being and ease their transition, such as bedding, personal belongings, and other comforting items.

The heart of Community Combined Ministries (CCM) is feeding children, souls, and empowering communities with HIS love. Our core objective is to cultivate unity across Berkeley and Jefferson counties by forging partnerships with individuals, churches, and businesses to alleviate food insecurity and address other essential needs within these communities. At the heart of our mission lies Kidz Power Pacs (KPP), our weekend food ministry operating under the CCM umbrella, alongside free community events. Through monthly gatherings, hundreds of volunteers spanning all ages come together to pack thousands of food bags, fostering a sense of solidarity and purpose while aiding those in need. CCM's objectives encompass raising awareness of the region's hunger challenges, educating on the adversities faced by children and families, dispelling the misconception that poverty is solely an issue of low income, and ensuring consistent access to nourishment for children. Over the years, CCM has distributed over 6 million meals to food-deprived children. Annually, we host a special Community Day in the Park, where local churches, nonprofits, and outreach agencies converge to provide essential resources and support. This event offers a day of free activities, music, and food, while also serving as an opportunity for attendees to learn about available resources and volunteer opportunities, enriching our community fabric. CCM also hosts an annual Christmas Party for all the children served through KPP. The children get to shop for toys, enjoy pictures with Santa, have a hot meal, crafts, games and each receive a large pantry box. The most profound impact we anticipate is the restoration of hope in the hearts and souls of the children we serve and the broader community that enables our mission. Together, we are stronger.

The Eastern West Virginia Community Foundation (EWVCF) uses West Virginia Neighborhood Investment Program Tax Credits to address the needs of over one-third of the 30,075 people in Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson and Morgan Counties living at or below 125% of the Federal Poverty Level (per Census.Data.Gov). In 2026 NIP tax credits will support the following projects that assist these low-income residents in our region:1. Emergency Assistance: With the increase in cost of living continuing to outpace the increase in wages, EWVCF is experiencing high levels of demand to provide resources to fund emergency shelters for the homeless, support a wide variety of programs addressing food insecurity, and assist organizations serving victims of domestic abuse. 2. Community Service: Organizations that provide daycare, foster care, youth recreation, healthcare, transportation, shelter and food pantries for low-income families will also be supported with NIP donations to EWVCF.3. Job Training and Education: EWVCF will award grants to technical schools for job training programs, along with education and mini-grants to teachers in Title 1 schools, in all five counties we serve. EWVCF is the only organization in this five-county region that brings together a wide range of businesses, donors, charities and grantees to build innovative, creative and unique partnerships that fill an underserved population in our eastern region of West Virginia. In collaboration with the only two major grantmaking private foundations in our region, we have leveraged local donations with outside resources to provide funding for specific initiatives. With support from these corporate and family foundations, local philanthropists, nonprofit organization leaders and NIP Tax Credit Allocations, EWVCF awarded more than \$1 million in grants last year to support programs vital to the region.

The Habitat for Humanity of the Eastern Panhandle Safe, Affordable Housing Program provides accessible, durable and sustainable housing opportunities for low-income individuals and families in the Eastern Panhandle of WV. Partner families selected by HFHEP must live in substandard housing environments that may be structurally unsound; lack essential services such as plumbing or electricity; be severely over-crowded; or be located in government subsidized units. Income guidelines are based on HUD's income limits at the time of application with most partner families being at or below 60% of the median family income. New homes are constructed on lots owned by Habitat for Humanity EP and sold to eligible partner families through a zero-interest loan amortized over 20 years. The loan amount is such that a families' mortgage payment including taxes and insurance does not exceed 30% of their income. Partner families with two parents are required to complete 500 hours of "sweat equity" by contributing to the construction of their home, performing Habitat-related tasks, and participating in homeowner education classes. The program also provides small exterior repair services to income-eligible residents of owner-occupied housing who are willing to partner with HFHEP, are able to make affordable payments (if required), and demonstrate a need for repairs. These projects may include landscaping, deck or porch repairs, among other small projects that preserve the integrity and safety of houses. Funds raised through the NIP Tax Credit Award will be utilized to purchase materials, building sites, and other essential supplies to support these projects. Each project undertaken by our program is designed to create a safe, healthy, energy-efficient living environment for partner families to call home. With donors and community volunteers, we assist partner families in building strength, stability, self-reliance, and shelter.

Early childhood education builds a strong foundation for children, yet many families in the Northern Panhandle face financial barriers and a lack of options that prevent their children from attending preschool during these critical early years. The Cornerstone Preschool Project expands access to high-quality early childhood education by providing scholarships for 3- and 4-year-olds to attend Cornerstone. CCA's Preschool program is effective and engaging, teaching early literacy and numeracy through creative play and hands-on learning, and it also includes instruction in special classes, such as Music, PE, and STEM.

The scholarships cover roughly 60% of tuition and will help prepare young children for kindergarten success and long-term academic achievement. In addition to improving school readiness, this project supports working families by enabling parents and caregivers to pursue employment or education, knowing their children are in a safe, enriching environment. By investing in early education through the Cornerstone Preschool Project, we aim to break cycles of poverty, close achievement gaps, and foster a brighter future for this community's youngest learners.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Tri-state provides guidance and companionship to youth through a one-to-one relationship with a caring volunteer to assist them in achieving their highest potential. This is done through a school-based mentoring program, a community-based program, high school mentoring programs, and corporate mentoring programs. Volunteers spend one-on-one quality time with at-risk children providing mentoring and friendship. What sets our mentoring program apart from many in the country is the on-going, professionally managed support that our families, children, and mentors receive during their match. Our staff of Match Support Specialists are social workers dedicated to ensuring that all parties feel safe and comfortable with the match, have the information necessary to be successful, and have support when/if things get difficult. Monthly match support conversations include conversations around activities, interests, and outings, as well as ensuring the ongoing appropriateness of the mentoring relationship and home environment. Following these match support communications, intervention is taken when needed. Our greatest challenge at Big Brothers Big Sisters is recruiting and enrolling adult mentors. This is amplified in our West Virginia region through geographic and economic challenges. Recruitment and support of youth in more rural areas requires higher levels of staffing, more intentional efforts, and more regional specific knowledge. This project will focus on rural expansion through community recruitment efforts, new school relationships, establishment of new corporate and community partnerships, and raising awareness of our services. The more we can enhance mentor recruitment, the more youth we can serve!

At CONTACT Rape Crisis Center, we are dedicated to providing comprehensive support to children from Cabell and Wayne counties who have experienced the trauma of sexual abuse. Our mission is to offer these young survivors and their families the compassionate care and practical assistance they need to navigate the aftermath of abuse and begin their journey toward healing. Our specially trained Child Victim Advocates play a crucial role in this process. These professionals provide emotional and practical support during forensic interviews and medical exams at the Child Advocacy Center (CAC) in Cabell Huntington Hospital. They also accompany and assist children and their non-offending caregivers as they interact with law enforcement agencies and the court system, ensuring they feel supported and understood throughout these challenging experiences. In addition to in-person support, CONTACT Rape Crisis Center offers around-the-clock assistance. Our advocates are available 24 hours a day to help with safety planning, provide counseling referrals, or simply answer questions that may arise at any time. This continuous availability ensures that children and their families always have a trusted resource to turn to, no matter when they need it. In 2024, CONTACT Advocates provided support to 245 children from Cabell and Wayne Counties who were affected by the trauma of child sexual abuse.

This project supports the expansion of our occupational, physical, and speech-language therapy programs to address growing needs in our community, especially among economically disadvantaged families. Through this initiative, we will expand our sliding-fee scale program, allowing more children to receive consistent, individualized therapy services regardless of their family's financial situation. Our project aims to improve the mental health of our communities by decreasing isolation experienced by those we serve. Our office receives numerous phone calls from community members seeking in-person visits and outings, which have become increasingly more valued within the populations we serve. Overwhelmingly, our services have centered on transportation to medical appointments and grocery stores. We hope this project changes that.Nearly every Care Receiver out of the 80 active Receivers we serve live alone. Due to physical disabilities, weakness, or diminished means of transportation, many of our community members live in isolation. We aim to reduce this isolation by extending our services to accommodate increased in-home visits, daytrip opportunities, and community organization outreach. We will accomplish these goals through our Volunteer base and community and faith-based organization relationships.We will provide activities for in-home visits, such as books, puzzles, and games. Volunteers can take these materials and spend time with our Receivers. For daytrip opportunities, we will provide \$20.00 vouchers to Care Receivers and Volunteers for a day each month. This will mitigate the costs of local activities and lunch during the outings. Finally, we will continue to connect with local youth and young adult organizations and associations within the community to provide handmade cards and crafts to our Receivers. We partnered with First United Methodist Church and Asbury Woods Winter Retreat for Valentine's Day. Youth at each organization crafted special messages to our Receivers, which received overwhelming praise from our Receivers.Our Care Receivers and Volunteers have a deeply committed relationship with each other. With an already extraordinary bond, the addition of the project's proposed visits, excursions, and community collaboration would further Receiver relationships with their neighbors, and benefit their mental wellbeing.

FTSC's proposed NIP project expands the reach of WVNIP by channeling funding – generated from endowments, donor-advised funds, restricted funds, and discretionary sources – into programs that serve at-risk individuals and support neighborhood revitalization in Cabell, Wayne, and Mingo Counties. Grants are awarded to both well-established and emerging nonprofits, including Goodwill Industries, United Way, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, A.D. Lewis Center, Ronald McDonald House, YMCA, Boys and Girls Club, Huntington City Mission, Team for WV Children, Ebenezer Medical Outreach, Heritage Farm, Christian Help of Mingo County, Children's Home Society, and Larry Joe Harless Center. Field-of-interest funds support projects focused on health, wellness, education, children, and community development. Discretionary funds provide critical early-stage support, such as seed money for new programs, matching funds for grants, training for staff, and equipment or technology purchases – particularly for small organizations without the donor base to apply for WVNIP credits independently. FTSC also collaborates with other funders and community partners, including the Pallottine Foundation, James H. Harless Foundation (Mingo County), Coalfield Development Corporation, and Heritage Farm Museum (Wayne County). We support place-based revitalization through efforts like the Huntington Innovation Project (HIP), which targets three blighted neighborhoods to improve housing, infrastructure, and job opportunities. In coordination with local leaders, nonprofits, neighborhood groups, and institutions such as the City of Huntington, Mountain Health, and Marshall University, FTSC ensures that its investments have broad, lasting, and measurable impact.

Goodwill KYOWVA cultivates collaborative communication practices that allow us to better serve our underserved communities. Our Counseling and Therapy Division provides in-person, virtual, or Telecommunication counseling sessions that fosters stabilizing behavioral health supports, which empower individuals to gain & retain high-quality employment. Participants also receive essential employability skills and appropriate interview attire.

Huntington Children's Museum (HCM) is dedicated to ensuring that STEAM learning opportunities are accessible to all children, particularly those facing financial hardships. Through a variety of innovative programs, the museum provides families in need with the chance to engage with its interactive exhibits and activities. One key initiative, "Museums for All," offers reduced admission of just \$2 per person during operating hours for families receiving WIC or SNAP benefits, with around 25% of visitors taking advantage of this program. Additionally, HCM has partnered with Central City Elementary, located in one of Cabell County's most economically challenged areas, to provide six complimentary field trips for students in Pre-K through third grade, along with six free family nights for all students. Central City Elementary serves over 400 students from preschool to fifth grade, with 83% classified as economically disadvantaged and 22% identifying as minority students. This year HCM is enhancing its community outreach by collaborating with organizations such as Big Brothers Big Sisters, Harmony House, the Ronald McDonald House, and Branches Domestic Violence Shelter. These partnerships aim to support at-risk populations by offering free tickets and hosting family engagement nights, fostering community connections and ensuring that individuals and families facing challenges can participate in enriching experiences. In its commitment to inclusivity, HCM plans to further expand its outreach by collaborating with after-school programs, aiming to serve even more children in the community and break down barriers to access. Through these efforts, HCM is dedicated to creating a welcoming environment where everyone can enjoy and benefit from the museum's offerings.

The Huntington City Mission (HCM) operates a community-based open-to-all food service program. The Mission was founded in 1939 as a soup kitchen for men experiencing homelessness. Eighty-six years later, we continue to provide the basic needs of food to men, women, and children, while also expanding our services to include overnight shelter, clothing, education, intensive case management programs, and behavioral health services. We are the only full-service shelter within a 50-mile radius of Huntington, WV. Daily, HCM provides shelter for approximately 200 individuals, including 40 children, every night. HCM is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Our food service program provides a daily average of over 700 meals to shelter residents and community members in need. One does not have to be a client of HCM to receive meals. Anyone is welcome to eat, no questions asked. We collect certain demographic information without being intrusive to the individual. Staff members monitoring the meal count collect approximate age, gender, race, and whether the individual is a community member or a current shelter client. Through this data collection, we see that more than half of all meals served are to the community at large. We serve three hot meals daily to anyone who shows up to eat. In 2024, HCM served 274,705 meals at no cost. We provided 56,097 nights of lodging, taking nearly 200 individuals off the streets each night. 80% of the individuals we served in 2024 originated from our local Tri-State area.

The John W. Hereford Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington have provided shelter, safe haven, and a nurturing environment for tens of thousands of children in the Huntington area since 1959. The club, as a whole, is our Project. We provide both after school and full day summer care to the most in need students in the Huntington area. 100% of our members fall below the poverty line and/or are food insecure. We have seen an increase in the number of foster children that we are serving. The number of members who aren't living with either parent has doubled in the last year. The meals we provide are the only food some of our members will get for the day. We served over 34,000 meals to our members in 2024. We are an after school program during the school year but we are an all-day summer program each summer. We provide breakfast, a hot lunch and snacks for our members daily. In addition, our programs and services are designed with the whole child in mind. Each year, approximately 500 children between the ages of 6 and 18 participate in our Power Hour Program, which is designed to include homework assistance, tutoring enrichment, educational computer programs and field trips. We design our program with field trips and experiences for our members to help them build as many connections as possible to the real world. Both club locations, B.C. McGinnis in Guyandotte and Henrietta Payne in West Huntington, are in neighborhoods with higher rates of poverty and crime, which shows the value of the clubs' purpose as shelter and a safe haven, both after school and during the summer. We aim to we provide support for the member and family when one or more parents or guardians maybe working or seeking employment. Focusing our efforts on providing shelter, food, safety, well-being, and educational advancement of our members, we hope has led and will continue to lead them to reach their full potential as productive, caring, and responsible citizens.

MERGE stands for Mentoring, Encouragement, Recovery, Guidance and Education, and is a program designed to keep the youth we serve in the best lane. MERGE is comprised of trained and employed young adults who mentor youth in the area from ages 7 to 18. Mentoring starts by building a relationship between the mentor and the youth. Tri-State Huntington Homeless Shelter (TSHHS), a fundraising arm of the Huntington City Mission (HCM), will use NIP support to sustain essential emergency shelter operations for individuals and families experiencing homelessness. Until FY2024, HCM received DHHR shelter voucher funding to offset shelter costs for those we serve. That program ended in 2024 and was replaced with a competitive grant process through the WV Coalition to End Homelessness. In FY2025, HCM was awarded funding through this new process, which enabled us to staff two full-time Emergency Shelter Coordinators (one for Men's Shelter and one for Women's Shelter) and two full-time Case Managers. These staff members provide critical support, ensuring smooth daily shelter operations and offering wraparound services, including case planning, employment assistance, benefit navigation, and help securing permanent housing. However, for FY2026, our award was reduced—as it was for all competing agencies—making it financially impossible to sustain these positions solely through grant funding. To continue offering safe shelter beds and transformational services, we must now rely on individual donations even more to bridge the funding gap. This NIP project will fill this gap. With the help of donors incentivized by NIP tax credits, we aim to raise the necessary funding to maintain these four positions and ensure uninterrupted care for individuals experiencing homelessness. These roles are vital not only for daily shelter functioning but also for helping individuals and families exit homelessness permanently. This project directly complements our mission and existing services, ensuring continuity and impact for our most vulnerable neighbors.

CISGC currently provides student support specialists in all public schools in Greenbrier County. CISGC offers one-on-one mentoring, tutoring and case-management services for students referred to our program due to behavioral, academic or social/emotional challenges. Our mentor programs pair students in need with a caring adult who focuses on and commits to their achievements in and out of the classroom. CISGC brings the community's talents and resources into our schools to develop group and schoolwide educational programming and to provide a host of physical resources for students and their families. Our services have become more even more intensive, focusing more on social, emotional and physical well-being rather than attendance and academics. We have adapted our program to meet the growing needs of our students through home visits, phone calls, letters home and video chats, and look to continue to adapt our program to ensure our students are safe and well.

Centered on meeting the immediate needs of our community and acting as a catalyst for helping our marginalized, low-income communities overcome the many obstacles they face while reaching true self-sustainability, the Day Haven continues to impact our neighbors in a profound way. This program offers a daily "safe haven" for the unhoused, transient, and low-income neighbors we support. At the Day Haven, individuals can meet their basic hygiene needs by utilizing our bathrooms and showers, washing their clothes in our commercial washers and dryers, eating a free community meal weekly, connecting to our free wireless internet, and get connected to a variety of community resources to better their lives or situations, all at no cost to themselves. This program aims to meet the emergent needs of our distressed community and help further instill self-reliance, thereby inspiring a reduction in their reliance on government-assisted programs. In addition to these services, the Day Haven also operates as a warming center during the cold months of the year, hosts frequent educational life skills workshops (such as nutrition instruction and job readiness), and hosts various health-related screenings (such as blood pressure clinics, vaccine fairs, and health fairs). We are also thrilled, through this program, to bring a registered nurse-led outreach initiative to broaden the healthcare access of the marginalized population we serve.

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The WVSOM Foundation will provide up to 10 scholarships of \$1,000-\$10,000 for low-income medical students from 54 high-priority counties in West Virginia who indicate they will practice medicine in the state. Priority counties have a poverty level of 17.2 percent or above (average of 21.77%), median household income of \$46,683 or less (average of \$41,086), and are designated medically underserved by the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services. Our project places more physicians into rural and underserved areas by prioritizing students with income at or below 125% of federal poverty level or less who are willing to practice in West Virginia. The Junior Project provides child forensic interview and family advocacy services for Junior, WV, one of Barbour County's most vulnerable communities. This initiative brings together multiple agencies in response to allegations of child sexual abuse, sexual assault, physical abuse, neglect, drug endangerment, witness to violence (including homicide), depiction in pornography, sextortion, and child trafficking. The project provides specialized forensic interviews conducted in a child-friendly environment, while multidisciplinary investigative team members view the interview in real time from an adjacent room. This approach helps to ensure that the interview is legally defensible in court, and the state-of-the-art recording system eliminates the need to repeatedly question the child victim about the abuse. The program's certified forensic interviewers specialize in specific protocols that prioritize the safety and comfort of the child and ensure that the interviewers remain unbiased. All clients referred to the program are assigned a family advocate upon intake. These advocates begin building rapport with the child's caregiver during the child's forensic interview. Family Advocates are vital pillars of the program, building and maintaining ongoing relationships essential to the victim's healing process. Advocates provide individualized support, including services such as referrals to medical and mental health professionals that specialize in trauma-informed care, applying for financial assistance through the Crime Victims' Compensation Fund, obtaining Protective Orders, and access to other support services as needed. Family Advocates also provide accompaniment support throughout court hearings and jury trials. In addition, The Junior Project provides body safety education to students at Junior Elementary School. Case review meetings are held monthly in Barbour County to ensure that all investigators and service providers receive comprehensive status updates.

ALICE stands for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed—a term used to describe households that earn above the Federal Poverty Level but still struggle to afford basic necessities like housing, food, healthcare, and transportation. These families often live paycheck to paycheck and face difficult financial trade-offs, such as choosing between medical care and childcare. ALICE households span all races, ages, and ethnicities. Many ALICE individuals work essential jobs—such as teachers, healthcare providers, and retail workers—but their wages do not keep up with the rising cost of living. The United Way developed the ALICE Threshold, which calculates the minimum income needed for financial survival based on local costs. In 2023, 38 million households in the U.S. were classified as ALICE, making up 29% of the population. When combined with households below the poverty level, 42% of U.S. families struggled to make ends meet. In 2023, 46% of all households were below the ALICE Threshold. We will continue to focus on our efforts to improve on these statistics over the coming year by investing in Partner Agencies and assisting ALICE Households through various programs and expanding upon those programs. Organizations such as ours use data to support ALICE households and advocate for policies that improve financial stability.

School year sites operate Monday through Friday, 2PM to 5:30PM. Summer session programs operate at the main HQ site (Emmanuel Baptist), 8AM to 5:30PM, weekdays. In our program, children engage in homework assistance, academic enrichment, skill-building activities, and recreational opportunities every day. Center staff provide supervision and implement curriculum such as the Second Step Violence Prevention program. Certified KCS teachers provide one-on-one and small group tutoring in reading and math as well as academic enrichment sessions. Opportunities for specialized activities are provided by community partners such as West Virginia State University (WV SU) and West Virginia University (WVU) Extension Services who provide STEM, positive youth development activities, and technical assistance. Throughout the whole year, children are provided free, nutritious meals each day that are certified and audited by the West Virginia Department of Education (WVDE) Office of Child Nutrition. School Year provides snack and dinner while summer programs provide breakfast, lunch, and snack. These meals are free of charge and the Center is an "open feeding site" that also serves any hungry child in need during our meals.

Families residing in Kanawha County's low-income neighborhoods who meet the eligibility guidelines for the 125% federal poverty line will qualify. Free tickets to Charleston Ballet performances will be available for the fall, spring, and special student performances. In addition, a scholarship study program is offered to young students (ages 4 – 16) in collaboration with the Partnership of African American Churches (PAAC) After-school 21st Century Learning Programs and the American Academy Ballet, the official school of the Charleston Ballet, where the children take ballet classes. Since 1990, the Childhood Language Center (CLC) has helped over 3000 children with speech, language, feeding and swallowing problems. The CLC is currently assisting 115 children from 14 different WV counties and has 12 children on its waiting list. The CLC's clients are dealing with a variety of difficulties, such as Autism Spectrum Disorders, Down Syndrome, hearing impairments, developmental delays and apraxia of speech. Research has found a strong connection between a child's ability to communicate and their behavior, including behavioral, emotional and social difficulties. If a child cannot communicate with his/her outside environment, this can lead to frustration and bad behavior as the child grows. It has been calculated that it costs \$2,500 to fund a child through one year of services at the CLC, which includes 50 individual therapy sessions, the opportunity to participate in group sessions and admission to the CLC's week-long summer camp. For many families in our low-income service area the CLC is the only option for speech and language therapy because it is free to any family, unlike many programs in our service area. The Sponsor A Child program allows individuals, businesses and organizations to donate \$2,500 or more in order to ensure that all children who require communication therapy have the opportunity. The donation can be either done as a lump sum or in payments as desired. No matter how the donation is given, children who would otherwise struggle to find affordable and effective speech therapy are assisted.

The project will support our 8-emergency child shelter whereas 88 children live each day waiting for a permanent home or placement. While in our care we provide all medical, psychological and educational needs. Children come to our shelters from across the state. Our shelters are located in Logan, Nicholas, Raleigh, Greenbrier, Kanawha, Wood, Hampshire and Cabell counties. Our shelter children/youth and their families are supported through our family strengthening programs. This project assists low-income and unhoused dog owners who are struggling to keep their pets fed and healthy. We want to help people keep their beloved pets at home with their family as opposed to rehoming, abandoning, or surrendering to a shelter. We feel a financial situation should not stand in the way of a family having a pet to love. Some people struggle occasionally to feed their pets so we buy truckloads of pet food in bulk and distribute it via food banks and at low-income housing areas. Flea infestations are very common in homes where untreated pets live, especially in the summer months. We distribute preventative to eliminate the bites and the spread of diseases from ticks, fleas and other parasites for pets and their owners. Flea infestations can lead to frustration and opting to get rid of a pet rather than treating the source. Many people living paycheck-to paycheck cannot afford the high cost for spay/neuter surgeries. We coordinate and pay for these procedures. We also pay for rabies vaccines and puppy vaccines. We provide pet containment products such as collars, leashes, harnesses, crates, and fencing to enable people to keep their pets safe. Keeping the pet population down and keeping pets with their families helps the shelter respond to animals who are truly in need of their services.

The Gabriel Project of WV helps babies in low-income families have a healthy, safe start in life through community-based immediate, caring assistance. Babies are totally dependent on adults to provide their basic survival needs. For low-income families, fulfilling their baby's basic needs is a constant daily stressful struggle. Low-income families are single parent households, wed and unwed couples, teen parents without sufficient support, and increasingly, kinship caregivers who unexpectedly receive custody of a young relative and are unprepared to meet the child's basic needs. The Gabriel Project assists these low-income families by purchasing and directly distributing formula, diapers, clothing, cribs and car seats that are cost prohibitive for impoverished families but necessities for their young child's health and well-being. We provide services according to each family's assessed needs through our network of community church sites and trained volunteers in the 27 counties of our project area. Formula, diapers and clothing are the most urgently requested basic needs. We distribute formula to families who depleted their limited monthly public nutritional assistance allocation or to families who do not qualify for public assistance yet cannot afford to adequately feed their baby. We also distribute specialized formula to low-income families whose babies have allergies, digestive problems or other medical issues. We supply diapers and infant/toddler clothes to low-income families to keep their child comfortable and to lessen health risks. The new cribs we provide give babies a safe place to sleep and reduce risks of rollover falling, positional asphyxia or other trauma. In our project area there are infants sleeping in adult beds or in wobbly strollers or baby swings because their families cannot afford a proper crib. We also distribute new car seats to secure and protect young children from death or serious injury in motor vehicle crashes or sudden stopping.

Each school that partners with us through the HOPE Closet Program is given a cabinet which is filled with toiletry items (shampoo, conditioner, body wash, deodorant, tampons, pads, etc) and restocked throughout the school year as needed. The goal of the HOPE Closet Program is to relieve some of the stress that students experience due to hardships or inconsistencies in their home life. It gives students access to necessities that will allow them to go to school confidently and prepared to learn. We will recruit, train, and match volunteer readers with eager classrooms in low-income areas. Readers act as "reading role models" for students. We will engage parents, grandparents, and teachers to help them nurture reading habits among their children. Innovative creative or unique: Read Aloud West Virginia is the only literacy organization to focus on student motivation from birth through high school. Read Aloud leverages the valuable out-of-school hours to improve students' reading proficiency by increasing student access to printed literature, (indicated by research as best for students). Read Aloud WV builds student reading skills in and out of school. In schools with the most consistent Read Aloud WV participation, reading scores rise. Teachers provide good, explicit instruction, and Read Aloud WV supports their efforts by contributing to children's background knowledge (the single biggest driver of reading comprehension), creating anticipation and desire around books, and helping students to discover books they enjoy. As children are motivated to read for pleasure, they hone the skills they are taught in school, and continue to add to their background knowledge, setting them up for ever more school success and lifelong learning. Many publishers, test makers, and educators assume that students must automatically suffer learning loss when they are away from school, but Read Aloud WV believes the opposite: When children are properly taught and sufficiently supported with books and opportunities, their natural curiosity will keep them learning, even during school breaks.

Rebuilding Together Charleston's NIP project will expand our homeowner support, volunteer engagement, and rapid response safety efforts to ensure vulnerable residents in Kanawha and Putnam Counties can remain safely in their homes while awaiting full home repairs. This project includes enhanced homeowner intake and navigation services to help seniors and individuals with disabilities access critical repairs, home assessments, and referrals to additional community resources such as food, transportation, and utility assistance. In addition, NIP funds will support the recruitment, training, and retention of volunteers who assist with project preparation, minor repairs, and ongoing maintenance tasks. Volunteers are a vital part of our work, helping us serve more homeowners while building stronger community connections. Finally, the project will support the launch of our Safety First Visit initiative. It is a rapid response effort to address urgent safety concerns for homeowners waiting on larger-scale repairs. These short visits, typically completed in under two hours, focus on high-impact, low-cost improvements that significantly reduce immediate risks in the home. The activities can include installing grab bars to prevent falls, adding smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, placing fire extinguishers, and ensuring visible house numbers for emergency responders. Additional tasks such as replacing burnt-out light bulbs, removing minor trip hazards, and adding anti-slip strips or mats in key areas further improve household safety. By completing these interventions early in the intake process, we create safer living conditions for vulnerable residents from day one, even as they remain on our waitlist for more extensive repairs.

The Religious Coalition for Community Renewal's Transitional Storage Center located within Saint Mark's United Methodist Church is a managed storage service providing 150 secure lockers and bins to people experiencing homelessness to store their personal belongings. The homeless face several barriers in trying to obtain shelter, services, and employment. Some of these obstacles are mental health and/or substance abuse problems, chronic health problems, disabilities, lack of access to transportation, and safe storage of their personal possessions. Providing a secure storage facility for the homeless helps to unlock the barriers that prevent them from obtaining permanent housing. Working with a case manager, the client, depending on the severity of the identified barriers, can expect to spend at least 3 months and up to 18 months in the program. The goal is for the client to achieve permanent housing using a Housing First approach with supportive services and collaboration among social service providers. In addition, the Transitional Storage Center offers a street outreach service to market the program, housing focused case management, showers and laundry, harm reduction, and a boutique where individuals experiencing homelessness may redeem vouchers for clothing.

Evidence shows that quality teaching, targeted programming, and increased student engagement can help address longstanding educational inequities in underserved West Virginia communities. Research by Dr. Robert Baltanz of Johns Hopkins University identifies three key predictors of school success—attendance, behavior, and course performance (the “ABCs” of dropout prevention) (Myers, 2022). For over 13 years, The Education Alliance (EA) has led a statewide AmeriCorps initiative that supports at-risk students in grades 2–12. The Education Alliance AmeriCorps (EAA) program uses Baltanz’s ABC framework to identify high-need students and deliver research-based interventions designed to improve academic performance. EAA’s theory of change centers on two key strategies: addressing the teacher shortage and delivering consistent academic tutoring and mentoring to at-risk students. The program’s vision is for every West Virginia public school student to graduate ready for college, career, or advanced training. During the 2025–26 school year, EAA will implement two core interventions: 1. Accelerated Teacher Pipeline: Sixty high school juniors and seniors enrolled in their local Grow Your Own (GYO) teacher preparation programs will serve as EA AmeriCorps GYO Members. These students will complete dual enrollment and AP courses, gain practicum experience, and follow an accelerated path to a teaching degree. While in high school, they will deliver weekly classroom mini-lessons, academic tutoring, and social-emotional mentoring to at least 18 at-risk students at their practicum sites. 2. Tiered Student Support: Twenty AmeriCorps Mentors—trained, caring adults—will provide weekly one-on-one and small-group reading/math tutoring and social-emotional mentoring to 18 at-risk students each, reinforcing academic engagement and preventing dropout. Together, these interventions build a pipeline of future teachers while supporting today’s struggling learners.

WV Health Right, Inc. (WVHR) is the state's oldest and largest free and charitable clinic. Since its inception in 1982, WVHR has added a variety of options to its clinical services, including health education classes, which provides tobacco cessation assistance, nutrition classes, teaching kitchen classes, and classes to help individuals manage chronic diseases such as heart disease and diabetes. In 2017, WVHR launched a state-of-the-art mobile dental clinic to provide free dental care to low-income adults in five rural counties in WV (Boone, Clay, Logan, McDowell, and Roane). Beginning July 1, 2025, WV Health Right will be adding a sixth county, Jackson, into the unit's rotation. Through this mobile dental clinic, WVHR will provide dental care and treatment to up to 1,800 impoverished uninsured/underinsured adults. In collaboration with various local healthcare partners in each service area, WVHR has adequate space and internet access to perform these services. These healthcare agencies also assist in identifying residents of their area who are eligible for these free dental services. Access to dental care services improves citizens' overall health status and decreases emergency room usage, which decreases the number of controlled substances prescribed to manage chronic tooth pain. Further, increasing oral health care access also contributes to promoting employability and economic development and stability. In addition to providing free dental services throughout rural areas, health education materials will also be provided to up to 1,800 adults to increase awareness for effectively managing chronic diseases and reducing habits that lead to chronic health conditions. These materials will be geared toward managing cardiovascular risks, diabetes, weight, hypertension, and tobacco cessation.

Level Two has been in progress for 1 year 4 months. It is providing transitioning individuals that have only minimal support systems with restaurant jobs, counseling, and housing. There are no rent deposits, or first month's rent requirements and other allowances are given based on circumstances. Providing jobs is not just pay for work. Individuals have problems getting and keeping jobs. They are problematic employees often with criminal records that require training, counseling, and special handling. 3. Level Three began in March 2024 and is ongoing. It is providing transitioning individuals that do not have support systems with jobs, counseling, housing, food, supplies, and other help.

HOPE, Inc. is a private, non-profit United Way agency that is licensed by the WV Family Protection Services Board to provide shelter and outreach services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault and their families in Marion, Harrison, Lewis, Doddridge, and Gilmer counties. HOPE's emergency shelter has been in operation since 1980 and is the only shelter facility for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in our five-county area. While receiving shelter, victims receive services that ensure their safety and allow them to seek alternatives to their current situation. Last year, 108 victims were housed for 4107 nights. For most victims we serve, shelter is their last option physically, emotionally, and financially. Our facility is handicapped accessible, while providing a safe, home-like environment for victims and their families. Most of our clients come to us with only the clothes on their back, so their needs are numerous. Our goal is to be able to provide our clients with the assistance they need to start fresh. This year our project will focus on providing our clients with the necessary financial assistance to make the move from shelter to a home of their own, free from abuse. To accomplish this goal, our clients need financial assistance in many different forms. The most basic forms would be rent and rental deposits, but often due to financial abuse, their needs are more numerous. They often need non-basic items such as paying to replace lost documents, a washer/dryer for those moving to rural areas with no transportation, minor car repairs so they can get to work, childcare costs until they qualify for assistance, etc. These financial needs often keep a victim from moving on from an abusive situation. Our goal at HOPE is not only to provide a temporary safe haven for our clients, but to help them achieve independence to survive on their own.

SARA'H'S House Child Advocacy Center is a child-friendly facility that provides a different way to investigate, treat, and respond to allegations of child abuse. These allegations can include sexual abuse, physical abuse, neglect, witness to violence, drug endangerment, exposure to/depiction in child pornography, and child sexual exploitation. Children ages 3-17, who have been victimized by abuse, receive services from certified professionals who coordinate investigative responsibilities with child protective services and/or law enforcement to increase the likelihood of a successful outcome. Some of these services include forensic interviewing and victims advocacy throughout the duration of the case, and oftentimes after closure. Children who receive services from our Center are then referred to a Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapist for treatment toward a healthy recovery. In the event that a medical examination is required, we have contract services with forensic nurse examiners who are specially trained to conduct these investigations. SARA'H'S House offers services to families in need, regardless of their ability to pay. The services provided at the Center are not available through any other organization in our community. SARA'H'S House strives to make our neighborhoods better by providing child abuse awareness and including prevention training opportunities for people who work with children. Along with this, staff visit the schools within our community and present prevention curricula to the students in attendance. We strive to provide not only reactive support in the face of crisis but also a proactive approach to the problem.

The Christian Help (CH) direct & emergency support services are provided at no cost to facilitate financial stability for individuals and families in, and to avoid, crisis situations. This includes grants-in-aid; vocational assistance; clothing, outerwear, footwear; infant needs; household items, small appliances, linens; and pantry orders. The emergency financial assistance (EFA) program helps with grants in aid to support identification documents critical to secure employment & benefits; or, to help pay a bill. CH EFA underwrites utilities, shelter, transportation, medical, and/or birth certificates & photo IDs. In CY24, we helped 1,1061 households with \$99,737 in aid. Confirmation of need (i.e., invoice) & legal obligation (e.g., account, vehicle, homeowner), and voucher acceptance from the vendor is required. Our vendor network is extensive, and our payment record is stellar. The Food Pantry (FP) & Free Store (FS) provide direct aid via donated in-kind products to help meet client needs and off-set financial shortfalls. During CY24, the FP served 1,277 households; the FS served 9,232 shoppers, plus 2,307 special & vocation needs at \$26,059 direct cost. Basic needs, such as food, undergarments, toiletries, clothing, & shoes, as well as survival blankets, hot hands & feet pads were given to our most vulnerable (i.e., homeless, low-to-moderate income) residents. The Career Closets (CC) & Life Skill Classes (LSC) assisted 379 individuals as they began & retained employment, or enhanced their knowledge of employment, finance, nutrition, & insurance matters. The CY24 costs for the work-required attire & educational materials provided totaled \$3,568. CH does more than simply help with finances. We listen to each unique situation and offer the most beneficial resources. Whether the resource is one of our programs or another agency's, no client leaves without the full support we can offer. Individual stability supports family stability which supports community stability.

Affordable Housing and Wraparound Services for At-Risk Youth

Project Information

Our new project is a Federal Home Loan Bank Affordable Housing project to provide housing for young women 18-24 transitioning out of foster care, the justice system, or recovery. Our renovated building at 80 School Street in Morgantown will also house a community center, serving youth ages 14-24. In addition, we are launching SOAR, a 12-month, intensive career and resiliency accelerator program. As part of the program, participants will be required to engage in productive activities each week and will receive a needs-based stipend and extensive wraparound services, including mental health counseling from Libera's mental health staff; support in receiving resources related to housing, food insecurity, transportation, insurance, financial assistance, etc.; weekly time spent with their 1:1 mentor; and more. This building will be a place to provide the most vulnerable young people housing, therapy, mentoring, wraparound services, and Libera groups and programs. The building will serve as a community center for all those we serve, including teens. We will be hosting community dinners and Libera groups at the community center, and we will provide mental health and other resources to those who participate. The building will provide transitional housing for up to 8 foster or justice-impacted youth leaving the system. In our work with transition age youth, we have discovered one of the main barriers they face is affordable housing. We have also discovered that the more time we are able to spend with these young people, the better they fare. Providing everything under one roof with staff and mentors readily available will foster greater growth and success for youth. Our goals with this specific project are to provide affordable housing for at least 5 low income transition age young women, 18-24; wraparound services for 10 low income transition age young women; and events for at least 25 low income youth and young women where we will provide resources and a meal.

We aim to break down barriers for our clients, whether they're facing physical, emotional, or social challenges. This approach helps us reduce disparities and ensure that more West Virginians can access the care and support they need to live healthier lives.

Mon Valley Habitat for Humanity began construction on the Norwood Hills Affordable Housing Project in Summer 2025. Two single-family homes with three-bedrooms and two-baths will be constructed on Saxman Avenue, Morgantown, Monongalia County. Additionally, MVHFH will provide critical repairs for up to five owner-occupied homes in Norwood Hills and the surrounding area. All selected for the critical repair program must be low- to moderate-income with priority given to those who are elderly, disabled, veterans, or have special needs. Population growth in Morgantown has outpaced the state average and the influx of residents has accelerated the deficit of safe, affordable, decent housing. Recent price escalation and interest rate increases have pushed affordable homeownership and home repairs beyond the reach of many area residents. MVHFH will select two families applying for the Homeownership Program based upon housing need; ability to assume a 30-year, zero-percent interest mortgage; and willingness to partner with MVHFH. The partnership requires 150 hours of "Sweat Equity" for family members 18 years-old and over – families work on their home (or that of a neighbor's); complete homeownership and financial education courses; and promote the Homeownership Program to potential applicants. When construction is complete and the two Partner Families have met all program requirements, they will buy their home with a zero-percent interest mortgage and an affordable monthly payment, calculated on their ability to pay. MVHFH will select up to five families applying for the Critical Repairs Program based upon need and who meet the low- to moderate-income criteria. Repairs will be limited to those improving accessibility with a focus on exterior repairs (porches, ramps, and exterior steps). MVHFH will complete these repairs at no cost to the homeowners.

Scott's Run Settlement House's (SRSH) Backpack Feeding Program provides food for the weekend to children who rely on school meals as their primary source of nutrition and experience food insecurity. Each week SRSH delivers bags containing breakfast items, lunch items, dinner items, snacks, and fruit item to the schools who then distribute them to the children enrolled in the program. Beginning in 2011 with 100 children participating at one school, the program has grown to serve over 850 children at 11 schools. The benefits of this program are quite substantial. Surveys from both parents and teachers indicate a positive impact in the children's mental, emotional, and physical health in addition to improved academic performance. Specifically, 78% of parents reported an improvement in their child's overall mood and behavior while 72% of teachers reported improved attention in class. The additional nourishment the program provides allows children to develop properly and decreases the stress associated with childhood food insecurity. The cost of this program is roughly \$150 per child, per school year. This reflects food costs alone and does not include transportation or staff expenses. For the 2025 - 2026 school year, SRSH's food cost will be approximately \$135,000. Additional funding will not only allow SRSH to continue to provide for hundreds of children in need, but it will also allow healthier foods to be purchased. With your support our program will continue to evolve and expand to ensure no child goes hungry.

The West Virginia Fund for Law in the Public Interest's summer project sends current WVU College of Law students into the field to serve the unmet legal needs of the poor. Our postgraduate project does the same, but with graduating students who will serve as full-time lawyers. These students and graduates address the legal needs of the poor by working in non-profit organizations throughout West Virginia that serve low-income clients in a variety of areas, including housing law, disability rights, family law, consumer law, and domestic violence. In 2026, our summer project will fund at least 15 law students; these students will each work full-time for 10 weeks. Our post-graduate fellowship project will fund 2 law graduates; each post-graduate fellow will work full-time for one year. Since the inception of the WV Fund for Law in the Public Interest ("the Fund") in 1987, our fellows -- each of whom completes a competitive selection process -- have provided thousands of their fellow West Virginia citizens with the free legal help they so desperately need. Specifically, the Fund has funded over 575 summer fellows who have served low income clients, primarily in civil legal aid offices. Since 2008, the Fund has sponsored 30 full-time, postgraduate fellows who have also served low-income West Virginians with complex legal needs. Their work helps their clients escape domestic violence, retain safe housing, protect their children, and obtain relief from fraudulent consumer debt collection practices. Our fellows serve clients by providing direct legal representation, by giving legal advice and information, by referrals to needed resources, by conducting legal research on their behalf, and by creating written informational pieces designed to educate them about their rights and options. Our student fellows work under the supervision of licensed attorneys. Our post-graduate fellows begin work once they have passed the bar exam and become licensed attorneys.

The Helpful Harvest Program was implemented in May of 2020 to address the increased need in food insecurity in Monongalia and Preston counties. In addition to addressing food insecurity, the program has had an impact on employee retention and job creation for people with disabilities and has assisted individuals in recovery and our veterans. The program also disrupts entrenched norms of food pantries providing unhealthy, nutritionally insufficient foods to those in need because of the food's affordability and availability. By providing healthy food options to pantries and feeding programs, we are not only addressing the immediate needs of those experiencing food insecurity, but also helping to address the long-term health issues faced by our communities. The program operates out of Preston County Workshop and at Hazel's House of Hope serving approximately 45 feeding programs and 9,000 individuals monthly. The Injury Prevention and Safety Program at WVU Medicine Children's is committed to improving the health and safety of children across West Virginia. Unintentional injuries are the leading cause of death and disability of children in the United States, and most are predictable and preventable. Education, age-appropriate safety items, and home safety modifications are proven to reduce injuries and deaths, but many West Virginia families are not able to afford these measures. Our program is a statewide initiative which provides resources and support to families, both in the hospital and community, aiming to support families with incomes less than 125% below federal poverty level. These families come from every county in our state including the twenty-eight counties identified by the Appalachian Regional Commission as distressed or at risk in FY2025. (County Economic Status in WV FY2025; arc.gov) Services are provided to families in the hospital after a baby is born or when a child is admitted with an unintentional injury, during community events like baby fairs and car seat checks, or when a community partner requests assistance. Our program also targets childcare centers, parenting groups, foster care agencies, schools, and clinics to help improve outreach and accessibility throughout West Virginia. Education is provided on safe car seat use and installation, safe sleep, shaken baby prevention, neonatal abstinence syndrome, and home childproofing to prevent injury. Age appropriate child safety items, such as car seats, booster seats, pack & plays, specialty car seats, medication lock boxes, and home safety kits are provided to families meeting low-income guidelines. Our Injury Prevention and Safety team is comprised of two National Child Passenger Safety Technicians and one Registered Nurse who follow best practice to help keep children safe and serve as a resource across the state.

Morgan County Starting Points, Inc. is a family support center with two locations in the county. NIP credit donations will be utilized to alleviate food insecurities throughout Morgan County. A school backpack program, a Community Kitchen, pop-up farmers markets, and school/community nutrition programs, teach as well as feed those struggling with food resources. Starting Points operates the Meal Time Community Kitchen (MTCK) which provides free hot meals three evenings a week; the Morgan County Backpack Program distributes weekly meal bags to an average of 230 children pre-k through 12th grade and summer meal bags through summer camps; pop-up markets distribute produce gleaned from the local Farmers Market in Paw Paw and at the MTCK. Paw Paw, a small community in the western area of Morgan County, continues to meet the USDA criteria of a food desert. There are limited food and fresh produce resources available within 45-minute drive. Starting Points, while serving all of Morgan County, continues to pour extra resources into this community with a bi-monthly mobile pantry from Mountaineer Food Bank and a partnership with Community Markets, Inc. with both resources serving approximately 135 Paw Paw area families. Starting Points also provides monthly food/hygiene/cleaning supply boxes to 20 Paw Paw area families who are at or below the 125% poverty level. Providing free food is great and helpful but for long term change the need for nutrition education is key. Our projects focus on encouraging families to make healthy food choices/purchases, preparing the fresh produce and growing their own food. A monthly Cheap Eats program in Paw Paw and county wide school-based programs provide information on meal preparation, and recipe repairs with healthier ingredient substitutions and shopping on a budget.

Nourish the Region: Increasing Food Security in the Upper Ohio Valley

As a grantmaking public charity, the Community Foundation for the Ohio Valley (CFOV) has worked for more than 50 years to enhance the vibrancy and resilience of communities throughout the Upper Ohio Valley and create a region where all current and future residents are thriving and reaching their full potential. To achieve this vision, the CFOV continues to adapt and evolve its responses to community needs, learn from best practices and from new research about underlying root causes of issues impacting the Valley, and seek the most effective grantmaking pathways to address these issues. One growing issue in the region is food insecurity. In 2023, roughly 1 in 6 people (15.5%) in our region were food insecure, as were approximately 1 in 5 children (20.5%) (Feeding America). Food insecurity means that a person has limited or uncertain access to adequate, nutritious food for normal growth and development and an active, healthy life. It is associated with numerous adverse health and social outcomes ranging from malnutrition and increased risk of chronic diseases to lower academic performance in schools, and the ripple effects of these adverse outcomes are numerous. In early 2025, the CFOV identified food insecurity as a focus area for its own discretionary grantmaking and launched a Food Security Fund to support nonprofits working to ensure individuals and families across the region have consistent access to adequate, nutritious food. CFOV staff and community partners also educated donors about the topic at the annual donor luncheon and surveyed service providers in the region to learn more about the work they do and the needs they experience. The CFOV's FY26 NIP project will enable the Foundation to double its current capacity to address food insecurity in the region through increased, targeted grantmaking. Funding raised through the project will enable the CFOV to make more grants to strengthen the local emergency food network and support long-term solutions.

The program provides free caregiver services to support the independent living of low-income older adults and individuals with disabilities residing in Marshall, and Ohio Counties. We provide services not covered by insurance and are not within the care receiver's budget. Transportation is crucial to ensure access to essential services such as medical care and grocery shopping. Transportation barriers are often cited for rescheduled or missed appointments, delayed care, and missed or delayed medication use. Transportation and other social determinants of health are interconnected. Lack of transportation to the grocery store can contribute to food insecurity. Affordable and reliable transportation is essential to a healthy community. A lack of reliable transportation represents a loss of independence and can significantly impact physical and emotional wellbeing. One size fits all transportation solutions are inadequate. FIAC offers flexible transportation for shopping, doctors' appointments, and other activities. One-way, round-trip, and multi-stop rides are available. The program provides door-through-door service, offering personal, hands-on assistance by helping individuals through the door of their residences and to their destination. The strength of the program lies in the residents of the community; volunteers come together from all neighborhoods to help their neighbors throughout Marshall and Ohio Counties. Our objective is to fill needs that fall through the cracks, tasks that you would think nothing of getting in your car and doing. Volunteers use their personal cars, their time and give back with care and compassion. Care Receivers receive the services needed which are not met through local transportation and/or other local agencies. The Greater Wheeling Coalition for the Homeless (Coalition) proposes a Workforce Stability program to address funding gaps for critical positions essential to the organization's daily operations and for administrative expenses. As a primarily grant-funded organization, support for personnel carrying out administrative duties and for administrative expenses are historically subjected to funding constraints of 10% or less of total grant awards. The Coalition has historically maintained low administrative costs by developing hybrid positions that carry out both programmatic and administrative functions and by leveraging support from community volunteers; however, the organization continues to witness funding gaps to adequately support the administrative responsibilities of designated personnel, including the Executive Director, Finance Manager, Program Development Specialist, and Administrative Services Coordinator. The Coalition is a dynamic 501(c)3 nonprofit organization providing housing solutions and supportive services to individuals and families experiencing homelessness in the Northern Panhandle region of WV through a comprehensive system of care. Programs and services include diversion, prevention, outreach and engagement, emergency shelter for families with children, temporary placement for all populations, rental assistance programs, youth 18-24 transitional housing, and wrap-around supportive services. Financial support for these positions ensures the Coalition can maintain efficient financial management practices, strategically improve the capacity of grant writing and program development and effectively deliver programs and services to the target population. The Coalition will utilize the Workforce Stability program to pursue sustainable funding for its Hearthside Shelter, a non-congregate emergency shelter for families with children that is the region's only available shelter option for this population and currently lacks dedicated financial support.

One in ten children in West Virginia will be a victim of sexual abuse by their 18th birthday. Traditionally, after making an abuse allegation, children are moved from agency to agency and endure multiple interviews, which create additional trauma of having to retell the circumstances of the abuse over and over. Harmony House is a Children's Advocacy Center (CAC), and our project is to provide a comprehensive, child-focused program based in a facility, a CAC, that allows prosecutors, law enforcement, child protection services staff, medical & mental health professionals, and victim advocates to work together to strengthen Ohio and Marshall counties response to child abuse. The project is to ensure that no child is further victimized by systems designed to protect them and their well-being is the first priority. To accomplish this, Harmony House CAC provides the following services to those children and their families that come through our door: forensic interviews provided by staff trained in ChildFirst; therapeutic intervention (on-site and through referrals), victim support and advocacy (crisis intervention, supportive counseling, case management, community resource information), case review and case tracking through a multidisciplinary team approach. Founded on September 4, 1984, Holy Family Child Care & Development Center (Holy Family) has been a cornerstone of early childhood education in Wheeling, West Virginia. Holy Family was established under the sponsorship of the Catholic Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston and then became a ministry of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph. Over the years, Holy Family has expanded its services, now operating from 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and serving approximately 90 children per month, ranging from six weeks to five years old. In August 2008, Holy Family broadened its mission by collaborating with Ohio County Schools to offer a Universal Pre-Kindergarten Program, providing individualized, child-centered education. Committed to inclusivity, Holy Family offers subsidized childcare through the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (WV DHHR), ensuring access for families regardless of income. Holy Family fosters a nurturing environment that enables each child to grow in body, mind, and spirit in response to the pressing need for emergency childcare services, Holy Family is launching Village Crisis Nursery, the first of its kind in West Virginia. Set to open in early 2026, Village Crisis Nursery will provide emergency, short-term shelter and care for children whose parents or caregivers are facing overwhelming situations, such as health crises, mental health emergencies, recovery needs, respite, or gaps in available childcare. Village Crisis Nursery aims to serve children from birth to 12 years old. By offering up to 72 hours of care, the program seeks to prevent child neglect and abuse, and to keep children out of the overburdened foster care system. All Holy Family programming now operates under the umbrella of Catholic Charities West Virginia. Since 1995, West Virginia has shown a steady increase in the cases of adult diabetes and obesity. Our State remains ranked #1 in the country for adult obesity and #6 for child obesity in low-income children between 2 - 4 years old (<http://stateofobesity.org/states/wv/>). To prevent that number from rising, nutritional education is important in a young child's life. We continue to use a variety of ways to teach and promote healthy eating at the Center. Our outdoor garden provides the Center with tomatoes, peppers, squash and cucumbers. The Center follows the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) and continues to be part of Keys 4 Healthy Kids, a program which provides tools and resources on proper nutrition for the children, staff and the families we serve. This program also teaches the staff how to implement changes and encourage children to try new foods. We continue to keep processed foods to a minimum, offer fresh fruits and fresh vegetables at meals, and encourage children to drink more water to stay hydrated. Tax credits awarded will continue these efforts, educate children on the benefits of healthy eating habits, and provide healthy meals for the children.

Access to the Parks offers each and every low-income child in Ohio County (WV), along with an accompanying parent, free admission to activities at Oglebay and Wheeling Park year around, where they can reap the physical, mental, educational and social benefits of spending time outdoors in the parks. The Edelman Garden, a project of the Seeing Hand Association, is located at 37 South Broadway Street in Wheeling. Established in 2014, the once vacant lot was donated by Aaron and Rhoda Edelman to The Seeing Hand Association to be developed into an urban garden. The vision for the garden was centered around the blind and visually impaired workers. It features handicap accessible concrete walkways, vertical shelves, tables, and overhead trellises to help our workers plant, weed, water, and harvest with ease. During late summer, our workers, board, and community are given free produce to help supply them with fresh vegetables. In the summer of 2024, we gave away over 350 pounds of fresh produce to those in need. In West Virginia it is estimated that 1 in 5 people face food scarcity. The produce is placed in bags on neighbor's porches and our workers also take it home. Any leftover produce is often left on the front step of our agency for those in need to take for free. The Children's Home of Wheeling provides a safe, therapeutic environment and comprehensive treatment for abused and neglected boys ages 12-18 referred by the WV DHR and court system. Nearly all residents have experienced multiple Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), including physical abuse, sexual trauma, and chronic neglect. To better support the healing process for our youth in residential care, we plan to enhance our therapeutic recreation activities, evidence-based materials, and facility by making trauma-informed upgrades. Funding will support the purchase of trauma-informed materials, minor renovations to improve lighting, sound, and comfort in therapy spaces, and structured recreational programming that promotes healing. This includes exercise equipment and outdoor group activity supplies (sports gear, team-building kits) that promote emotional regulation and social connection. A portion will enhance our recreation area to support structured group activities that foster engagement, safety, and community building. The mission of Youth Services System, Inc. (YSS) is to create better futures for children, families and our community. Since 1974, YSS has cared for vulnerable youth and adults through shelter, behavioral health, recovery programs and more. Our work began when Brother Ron Mulholland fostered two teen boys, which became the Samaritan House emergency shelter (ages 8-17). This grew into additional services, including the Helinski Shelter for young girls (ages 8-17) and transitional housing for youth who aged out of foster care or the shelters (ages 17-21). YSS also provides services to homeless and street youth in the community. In FY 2024, YSS served 92 youth in our emergency shelters and 110 in transitional living and community youth. In 2017, we expanded services through our sober living homes for adult men and women and in FY 24, YSS served 58 people in our recovery homes. The services offer good health practices, education and employment opportunities. Also, in 2017, we opened a free store offering clothing and household items. In 2023, we opened two food pantries. One for the community and one for the youth in our transitional living program. YSS staff help unhoused individuals who need services by assisting with resources, emergency funds for deposits and the first month's rent through a private funding source. YSS operates the Ronald C. Mulholland Juvenile Center, a secure juvenile facility serving youth ages 10-21 through a detention program. We offer a range of programs and services including Youth Mentoring Network (formerly Big Brothers Big Sisters), prevention and intervention services that promote social and emotional well-being, school-based mental health and suicide prevention in schools, behavioral health services, including Quiet Minds for youth experiencing psychosis and family support through supervised visitation and parenting classes. The youth and adults we serve are seeking better futures for themselves and their families.

The after-school theater program targets low income and at risk families. The Hope and Healing Scholarship Program provides scholarships for adults trapped in substance use disorders (SUDs). Coming to us through various channels, neither they nor their families have the means to afford help, but these men and women are worth rescuing! Rodney is one of those rescued: His friend searched for him until he found him in a crackhouse, lying at death's door. Taken to the hospital, he recovered enough to come to Brian's Safehouse. He came with no shirt, one shoe, and holding a bottle of soda—his only possession—that he feared we would take from him. We kept it for weeks where he could see it—and see that we were here to help him. Rodney couldn't believe that people weren't out to get something from him, but gradually he began to trust; he threw his old soda away, and he grabbed hold of a new life. He learned that there is Hope. He learned to be joyful without getting high. He learned to deal with emotions, fears, and past hurts—hurts against him and hurts he had caused others. He now lives at the Safehouse, telling and showing residents there is a new life! Over the 12 months of the residential program, residents are given the skills and the time needed to rebuild their lives and escape the enslavement of SUDs and all chemical dependencies in a safe, closed-campus environment. Our strong Aftercare Program and close-knit recovery community with transition housing units, graduated rent, transportation, and mentoring help ensure continued recovery and a successful reentry into society. Hope and Healing: Scholarships for Substance Use Disorders has brought freedom to Rodney and many others and will continue to bring freedom to men and women, lifting them out of poverty, hopelessness, and even lives of crime and raise them up to live lives of purpose and productivity. Health and healing CAN come to them and their loved ones; families can be restored and the cycle of addiction and despair broken. There IS hope for addiction!

<p>In 2026, Hospice of Southern West Virginia will hold the 13th annual Camp Hope. This children's bereavement camp is expected to serve at least 40 children in a secure and nurturing atmosphere with activities led by licensed professionals. Recognizing that each child's personal loss is unique, the camp staff provides a safe environment where grieving children receive comfort and support to facilitate the healing process. They form lasting friendships and enjoy activities that encourage them to be kids. Camp is scheduled to last 3 days and will be held at a location that offers an array of activities in addition to the therapeutic exercises. Participants will receive engagement opportunities such as storytelling, arts, journaling, group discussions, and interactive group exercises such as an obstacle course, yarn-web, yoga, and constructing a memory box. Camp Hope offers children who have experienced the loss of a loved one the opportunity to understand both the individualistic nature of grief and to connect with peers who are also working through loss. Attendees are able to express their grief in a safe, non-judgmental environment, focusing on their own unique healing process rather than being told how they should grieve. Camp Hope uses engagement techniques coupled with best practice models to support children. This program directly affects the lives of hurting young people in a positive way. In addition to coping with deaths from aging or disease, Southern WV counties have been ravaged by loss from the opioid epidemic, with WV still leading the nation in rates of unintentional overdose deaths. The need for bereavement services in our four-county service area is critical. True to its name, Camp Hope gives hope in terms of positivity and mental health support for children. Camp Hope acknowledges that grief is a difficult process of the human condition, but healing is possible.</p>

Davis & Elkins College has a proud and enduring tradition of serving first-generation and low-income students. Founded in 1904, the College was established to expand access to higher education for the citizens of Elkins, West Virginia, and the surrounding rural Appalachian region. Honoring that mission, the Highlands Scholar Program was launched in 2009 to make private higher education more affordable for students across the state. Initially created for a seven-county region, the program offers enhanced scholarships to qualifying students with a minimum 2.5 GPA: \$19,000 per year for residential enrollment and \$16,000 for commuters—totaling \$76,000 and \$64,000 over four years. Recognizing the need across West Virginia, D&E later expanded the Highlands Scholar Program to include students from all 55 counties. Those outside the original region receive \$14,000 per year for on-campus enrollment and \$11,000 for commuting—bringing a private college degree within reach for many families. Many of these students are not only the first in their families to attend college, but often the first to graduate from high school. The program provides a meaningful pathway to a high-quality, private education close to home—at a cost students and families can afford. To date, Davis & Elkins has invested more than \$46.9 million to support 2,424 Highlands Scholars from the original seven counties. In fall 2024, 161 students enrolled from that region; for fall 2025, 110 have already committed, with more joining each day. At Davis & Elkins College, students thrive in small classes, benefit from individualized attention, and are embraced by a supportive campus community. Since 1992, the Upshur Cooperative Parish House has served our Upshur County “neighbors” by providing access to basic necessities—food, shelter, clothing, and warmth—during times of need. For our 2025 NIP project, we propose expanding our core outreach services while launching new programs that address growing gaps in support for children and families. With reductions in SNAP benefits and limited funding for programs like LIEAP and Dollar Energy, our Crosslines program is expanding. As the county’s most consistent source of emergency utility and rental assistance, Crosslines is expected to support 800 households in 2025—helping prevent evictions and shutoffs for our most vulnerable neighbors. After the WV Department of Education took control of Upshur County Schools in 2023 and the Excess Levy failed, service gaps have emerged—especially for food-insecure students. In response, we launched the Break Bag program to provide meal kits to students during extended school breaks, when vital school-based meals are unavailable. In 2024/25, we expect to serve 725 students at Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Spring Break. Beginning in 2025, we will extend this support through our new Head Start Bags program, providing monthly food assistance (including summers) to 120 preschoolers—100% of whom live below the poverty line and get no weekend food support from the County school system. To improve overall well-being, we also offer items not covered by SNAP but essential to daily life. Our Holiday Meal Packages provide all the ingredients needed for a complete holiday meal, allowing families to celebrate with dignity. Additionally, we will distribute over 3,200 dignity-focused pantry kits—including hygiene products, cleaning supplies, and diapers—to promote health and stability throughout the year.

Recreational Activities for Golden Girl Group HomeGolden Girl Group Home houses 24 girls ages 12-18 who have been sexually abused, neglected and abandoned. The girls have been taken out of their homes and brought to us to live, grow and heal. Unfortunately, funding for recreational activities is not available for our girls. Research shows that girls who have been victimized (especially sexually) shows an increase in positive behaviors due to a variety of recreational activities for them to engage in. It is increasingly expensive, especially with the current national inflation and uncertainty in the markets, for 24 girls to have activities throughout the year. Also, the availability of donor designated funds toward recreational activities are slim. Recreational activities include: annual membership to the local YMCA, specialized trauma stretching with moves that increase self-esteem & confidence and an annual camping trip which includes wildlife educational activities and cultural arts enrichment. The variety of activities along with the extra staff cost, travel and other expenses are necessary for this program. The girls that come to live at Golden Girl are orphaned, traumatized and come from poverty stricken homes. The stipend received per day to cover the cost of living for the girls to be at GGGH does not include resources to provide for recreational activities. The combination of poverty and abuse creates such a bondage within the hearts of the girls that it shows in their behaviors and all aspects of their lives. Commitment and a variety of fun, rewarding and educational activities significantly helps the healing process and produces more positive behaviors. According to "The Journal of Abnormal Psychology" children especially adolescents that have Post Traumatic Stress Disorder caused by abuse and neglect benefit tremendously from consistent "fun" and "diverse" recreational activities. Society benefits and the cycles of abuse are broken.

Over the past four years, the Boys & Girls Club of Parkersburg has expanded its transportation network from just two participating schools to 21 schools across Wood County—a dramatic increase that reflects both rising demand and our commitment to accessibility. In 2024 alone, we safely transported 17,067 youth to the Mary Street Clubhouse, and we anticipate that this number will continue to grow as the 2025–2026 school year begins. To meet this growing demand, our proposed NIP Project includes the purchase of an additional Club van, bringing our fleet to five vehicles, and the renovation of our current garage facility. The garage upgrade will include the installation of a new bay door, removal of outdated equipment, and the creation of additional parking space to consolidate our fleet in a secure, weather-protected area. Currently, our vans must be parked in separate areas due to limited space, which complicates maintenance and logistics. Expanding and renovating our garage will allow us to: * Protect our vehicle investment and extend their lifespan * Improve operational safety and efficiency * Support a higher volume of transportation routes * Enhance the security of our vehicles * Reinforce our commitment to quality, reliability, and youth care This project directly complements our existing out-of-school time programming by addressing a critical access barrier for families. Improved transportation capacity ensures that more youth—especially those from low-income and high-need areas—can attend programs that offer safety, mentorship, academic support, and meals during vulnerable hours after school and throughout the summer.

Habitat for Humanity of the Mid-Ohio Valley builds homes in partnership with those in need of affordable, permanent housing. Homebuyers partner with our organization by agreeing to work on their own and other Habitat homes, take homeowner readiness courses, and repay an interest-free mortgage. Habitat homeowners work alongside community volunteers to build their home. Habitat MOV also administers a Minor Repair program for low-income homeowners, enabling them to stay in their homes by making needed repairs. Access to affordable housing is a challenge for many low-income families in our community. Housing that is available is oftentimes substandard. One in nine households in West Virginia are burdened by housing costs spending half or more of their income on housing (Habitat for Humanity International, 2022 State of Home Affordability in West Virginia). Habitat's affordable homeownership and repair program is a solution to address the rising cost of housing in our communities. As part of this project, Habitat will construct one single family homes in Wood County, and we will make simple repairs on six homes, located in Wood County. As a result of the projects, at least 15 low-income individuals will be in safer, more stable housing. In addition to building and repairing homes, Habitat will also provide homebuyer education and home maintenance classes in order to prepare partner families for owning their home. Our Minor Repair program for low income homeowners has set a goal to complete one repair project per month with half of those being in Wood County, WV. Approximately 12 West Virginians will be impacted annually by these repairs, and will not be forced to move into less stable/affordable living situations.

Humane Society of Parkersburg provides free spay/neuter procedures and a one-year rabies vaccine to low-income individuals. Eligibility is verified by participation in one or more state or federal assistance programs. Our veterinarians provide this service by appointment in our free-standing spay/neuter clinic along with providing services to the general public. Our standard cost for these services is low; however, this can still be a barrier for some clients who would otherwise have their animals altered to help with the pet overpopulation. This project allows low-income pet owners to receive these services by presenting an award letter, Medicare or Medicaid card or any other documentation validating participation in some form of government assistance. Appointments ensure adequate staff resources are available to provide the safest care for each of the animals being altered. The clinic's goal is to provide these services and prevent unwanted or unneeded litters of puppies or kittens that increase the number of pets the owner has to provide care for or re-home.

The Parkersburg Area Community Foundation (PACF), a trusted public charity serving West Virginia for more than 60 years, is governed locally and supported by more than 200 community volunteers. Together, they build and manage charitable funds that provide grants to meet the critical needs of economically disadvantaged individuals and communities. The PACF's FY 2026 Neighborhood Investment Program (NIP) project will continue to address essential needs, including basic human needs, food access, youth care, and substance use disorder prevention and recovery services. To fund these efforts, PACF will leverage its 24-hour online giving event, Give Local MOV, and three key initiatives: Community Action Grants Program: Competitive grants addressing identified community priorities. Community Sponsors Program: Sustains the PACF's capacity to serve. Targeted Field of Interest Funds: Hunger Fund, Safety Net Fund, and Recovery Fund. The PACF distinguishes itself by uniting citizens in its service area to collaboratively improve their local quality of life. This is achieved by collectively raising funds for the public good and distributing grants to address the most pressing needs in their communities. The PACF enhances regional civic capacity by involving volunteers in organizational leadership through its Regional Affiliates network and locally based citizen committees. The PACF's FY 2026 NIP project is particularly focused on the counties within its service region, where it is the sole community foundation funder. Notably, three of these counties are classified as "distressed" and two are "at risk" by the ARC, underscoring the critical need for the PACF's support in these areas.

Project Information

The Parkersburg Art Center (PAC) will continue the very effective "Art is Life/Life is Art" program, which recruits and engages area senior citizens with low and/or fixed incomes. These individuals will participate in creative art activities at a very low cost, and all their art materials will be provided. 12-session art classes will each enroll students who will be 55+ years of age. Art activities will be offered at two or more off-site centers for senior citizens, including classes taught at Blennerhassett Island State Park. One hundred+ will be involved in one of the daytime classes, for which they will pay a nominal tuition. We expanded the offerings this year, and plan to do the same for the coming year, with sessions devoted to weaving, paper maché sculpture, monotype printing and mixed media, as well as basic and advanced painting, drawing and working with clay. The program is designed to get older individuals out of the house and involved in creative activity with their peers. It provides social contact for those who are alone and isolated. Peer assistance and collaboration on projects will be encouraged, building a cohort of senior citizens who are actively engaged in MAKING. Students are encouraged to come to PAC whenever they like to work on their projects in their dedicated classroom. A new twist added this year has been the monthly "outdoor art for seniors" taught on Blennerhassett Island, which includes a ferryboat ride. These excursions are a fun, social extra offered to our "Art is Life.." participants. The culmination of the program is a main gallery exhibit, with an opening reception, open to the public at no charge, that displays the work of all the senior artists. This event is focused on getting older individuals engaged and enjoying viewing, learning and working together in the arts.

Our Grow Family Program for Expectant and New Parents provides for the needs of mothers, fathers, and babies in the Mid-Ohio Valley. The Grow Family Program is a support service of Women's Care Center and consists of four areas of support for mothers and fathers: 1. Mentoring 2. Education 3. Community Connection 4. Material Assistance. Many of the families who are enrolled in our program visited our medical clinic at the beginning of their pregnancy for no cost pregnancy testing and ultrasound. We also accept those who call us with needs including foster families who have received infants with very little notice. Mothers and Fathers schedule mentoring times in our clinic each month and they have the opportunity to complete online parenting and self-help courses from our Bright Course library. Completing these courses not only provides valuable education but it gives parents a way to earn credits toward large baby items during their participation period. They can earn up to three sizable items including strollers, cribs, and car seats. During their mentoring visits, parents discuss the completed educational segments, share current parenting challenges, receive encouragement and a listening ear from our volunteer mentors. We assist with various requests from our families for needs they have in their homes such as assistance with utilities and household items. If we are unable to help directly, we maintain a community resource catalog for crises the family may be experiencing. The parents end each visit with a "shopping" session in our boutique where they select exactly what they need. Parents find the boutique stocked with diapers, wipes, baby clothes and misc. items that parents need for their children. Moms and Dads have their own section of the Boutique with maternity clothes, toiletries, and gift items. Parents can participate in the Grow Program until their children are 18 months old. All services and material goods are at no charge to our families.
