




National LWCF State Assistance Goals...


- 1. Meet state and locally identified public outdoor recreation resources needs to strengthen the health and vitality of the American People.


WVDNR's State Wildlife Action Plan (SWAP) breaks down fauna, land, and water assets into 21 state Conservation Focus Areas (CFA's) that can include a range of particular Areas of Environmental Concern....

- Watershed or sub-watershed areas serving as public water supplies....
 - Watershed or sub-watershed areas threatened by water depletion or degradation....
 - Prime or virgin forests....
 - RTE remnant species habitats....
 - Biodiverse or historic areas subject to irreversible loss if developed....
 - Existing state or federal parks, forests, or wildlife management areas or areas so identified for potential acquisition....
 - Unique geological formation areas....
 - Floodplain or floodway areas that constitute a natural hazard area.

New parks or acquisitions with AEC's typically require Environmental Assessments!









Policy Plan

• Priority One:

Acquire and/or develop local, basic park and playground facilities in rural, non-metro areas of the state.... Basic facilities proposed can include shelters, walks, restrooms, shade and play areas, benches, trash receptacles and signage.

Priority Two:

Provide funding assistance for the maintenance of, or addition to, local or state parks, forests, or wildlife management areas when such assistance is needed to support demands beyond the present.

Priority Three:

Renovate or expand state or local parks with new projects or acquisitions including conservation areas as multi-purpose developments to engage and promote active lifestyles, innovate community cores, attract or retain visitors to an area, or preserve and protect some area of environmental concern.

SEC. 6(f)(3) No property acquired or developed with assistance under this section shall, without the approval of the Secretary, be converted to other than public outdoor recreation uses. The Secretary shall approve such conversion only if he finds it to be in accord with the then existing comprehensive statewide outdoor recreation plan and only upon such conditions as he deems necessary to assure the substitution of other recreation properties of at least equal fair market value and of reasonably equivalent usefulness and location: Provided, That wetland areas and interests therein as identified in the wetlands provisions of the comprehensive plan and proposed to be acquired as suitable replacement property within that same State that is otherwise acceptable to the Secretary, acting through the Director of the National Park Service, shall be considered to be of reasonably equivalent usefulness with the property proposed for conversion.

• Planning:

(Organization Key!)

• Budgeting:

- Group strategy-making encouraged to decide options, engage stakeholders...get project 'co-designers'...
- Basic Navigation: forms, advice from WVDO first....
- Finding service providers—RPDC's, NPO's, others, ...
- Fundraising and other efforts: match negotiations...site planning...writing and assembling documents....
- Getting service providers responses: RPDC, DNR, DEP, 20.
 USFWS, SHPO, NPO's, others...
- # varies, grants \$5000 to \$25,000 (# varies up to unobligated fund balance);
- Four awards, each for \$50,000 or less (each, \$100,000 total project cost);
- One award for \$100,000 or less (each \$200,000 total project cost):
- One award for \$200,000 or less (each, \$400,000 total project cost);
- One award for \$500,000 or less (each, \$1 million or greater project cost);

• Timelines:

- December 31, 2020 due date;

Narrative Statements:

Selecting a project...objectives restated:

Basic LWCF objectives—preservation of open space for public use and enjoyment...promotion of physical activity...provision of adequate recreational services...protection of areas of environmental or ecological importance...enhancement of overall community development.

WV-SCORP Priorities...state one or more:

- 1. Acquire and/or develop local, basic park a d playground facilities in rural, non-metro areas of the state....
- 2. Provide assistance for the maintenance or addition to park facilities to restore or maintain services beyond present demands....
- 3. Renovate or expand parks with new projects or acquisitions to engage and promote active lifestyles, innovate community cores, attract or retain visitors to an area, or preserve or protect some area of environmental concern.



Quality Checks... (part three--PDESF)

For the following types of proposals only this Cover Page is required because these types of proposals are administrative in nature and are categorically excluded from further NEPA environmental analysis. NPS will complete the NEPA CE Form. Simply check the applicable box below, and complete and submit only this Cover Page to NPS along with the other items required for your type of

proposal as instructed in the LWCF Program Manual.



Sample Narrative Organization for "Multi-Purpose" Recreation Project (recreation/conservation)

- Tag and frame observations of what you see in the landscape's project area (streams, floodplains, existing parks, views, proximities, etc.)
- Add known history of site, present use and condition...
- Locate & describe special environmental qualities (water uses, species habitats, educational values, etc.) and how buffered, or not....*
 *may require formal NPS-specified environmental assessment
- Describe particulars of recreational project, type of experiences sought, (tie to landscape) and concrete details of who and how service to be done.

The State's Open Project Selection Process (OPSP) evaluates project according to a number of criteria including the following: originality with respect to concept and use of other resources, the applicant's park history including any deferred maintenance, any parkland conversion issues, any lack of progress with prior or current construction, any competition of the project proposal with the private sector, the project sponsor's handicapped access compliance, the number and size of prior grant awards, and the merits of the project's design as it relates to its completeness, quality and readiness to be bid. Major application errors and omissions include: lack of detailed budgets, lack of documented match, lack of SHPO or other environmental clearance, lack of UASFLA-qualified appraisals on any project land acquisitions, land acquisition without development, and/or missing narratives from ESF or state application sections dealing with a project's description, impact or other collaborations.

 - Work Products: plans & maps written justifications detailed budget documented match possible Environmental Assessment....
 - Project Implementation:

 - scale-out situation—organize phases as stand-alone pieces...
